COMPANY "H."

Halifax Bic's it a Most Enthusiastic Farewell. HALIFAX, Oct. 25—Amid scenes of the wildest enthusiasm, company "H" of the Canadian contingent, left the army barracks at 10 o'clock this morning for North street depot, headed by bands of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the local militia forces.

The train made the run to Truro in one hour and a half. A brief stop was made at Truro, where the men were met by the mayor and corporation. Company "H" left Halifax with the full complement of 125 officers and men of rank, and was accompanied by three officers, two lieutenants, one bugler and 119 non-commissioned officers and men.

THE BEST OF COMPANY "G."

A special with the Halifax contingent arrived here after ten o'clock and were immediately taken to the New Brunswick and P. E. Island contingent. The party leaving by a special train made of 12 cars and two engines, shortly before eleven o'clock.

THE REGULARS LEAVE

Fredericton and Will Join Our Men at Chatham Junction. FREDERICTON, Oct. 25—There was a good turnout of citizens this afternoon to see the R. C. R. L. contingent off for Quebec, where they embark next week on their seven thousand mile voyage to South Africa. The contingent paraded in the barracks square at 2.30, and were inspected by Capt. Carpenter. They were given their service caps and red serge without waist belts, in being the intention of the militia department to supply them with a complete kit at Quebec. The other members of the company all turned out at the same time to accompany the contingent to the depot. The band of the 71st Battalion was on hand to play the contingent to the station, and at 2.45 the order to march was given. The band playing an inspiring quickstep led the way out of the barracks gate and down Queen street and hundreds of enthusiastic people followed them. There was a great jam of people at the depot and the soldiers were cheered again and again as they boarded the train. The band, from a position near the station platform, played several appropriate airs, and the train, which was escorted by the R. C. R. L. contingent, moved with a grand flourish and a grand flourish. The train left the depot at 3.15 and the crowd gave a hearty cheer which was taken up by the soldiers from the cars. Captain Carpenter accompanied him to Chatham Junction, where they will join the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia companies.

ARE AT QUEBEC.

Provincial Boys Have Arrived Satisfactorily—What is Being Done. QUEBEC, Oct. 26—Companies "G" and "H" from the maritime provinces, to the number of 275, reached Quebec at 4.30 p. m., and marched to the immigration building, escorted by the R. C. A. band. Major Weeks is in command of "G" company. They are the bodies of men. The immigration buildings are in the best order, and the staff left nothing undone to make the soldier boys comfortable during their short sojourn here. At the Citadel about 50 volunteers for the Transvaal are quartered in a large room at the chain gate, and the line in several casemates. Guards were placed last night on the chain as well as main gate and Citadel entrance and nonvolunteers were allowed out and it is not likely they will be for a couple of days. In the meantime clothing and equipment are being served out with all dispatch possible. General Hutton and Hon. Dr. Borden, minister of militia, are expected here tomorrow. It is not likely there will be a church parade Sunday on account of not being able to fit the men out in time. The minister of militia favors the idea of having a band accompany the contingent and the R. C. A. band may be ordered to proceed to South Africa. A dinner to the officers at the Garrison Club is being arranged for 6.30 p. m. Monday and will be concluded in time to enable them to attend a smoking and promenade concert to be tendered the night. It is not thought possible the contingent will be able to get away before Wednesday, as all stores have not yet reached the city. It is expected quite a number of officers from garrisons in the Maritime and the contingent, including Sergeants Major Balmford and Fellows; Sergeant Instructor Southland; Sergeant LaSalle; Lieutenant Carroll, and Corporal Bisette and Power. The 53rd annual session of the Grand Division Sons of Temperance of New Brunswick opened in the Market building last Wednesday evening, the grand worthy patriarch, Rev. James Crisp, in the chair. This has been paid to grand treasurer. The difficulty of arriving at accurate conclusions, because of the incompleteness of returns, is spoken of but the grand scribe in his report concludes that the order has not held its own during the year. The multiplicity of secret societies which support the temperance cause, and the report says this is the cause. The finances seemed to decrease even greater than the membership. About 1.50 per cent. per capita tax to grand division last year. It is largely due to the custom of returning divisions which are behind as being in good standing, hoping they will yet pay. Grand division is today face to face with a deficit which must be made up—the matter of the financial standing with the national division must be grappled with.

It is being considered to make the grand division's paper, Forward, a weekly instead of semi-weekly. The matter will come before general division. On the matter of correspondence the grand scribe reported that there was nothing of unpleasant character to lay before the division. The grand superintendent of young people's work, had been most painstaking and zealous. A report from him would be received. During the year, the grand scribe visited the district divisions of Kings and St. John counties. Both were good factors for temperance work. Of these divisions in other counties is much to be desired. Visitation to divisions, organizing and reorganizing has been carried on by grand division officers. Special mention is made of the services in this respect of Rev. G. W. Fisher of Newcastle, A. J. D. Murray, of Red Bank division, and Mr. J. R. Woodburn, Bro. Hennigar, Bro. Law and others of St. John.

The report spoke well of the standing of the S. of T. National Mutual Relief Society and strongly recommended the insurance to the order. Mr. J. E. Roberts of Boston, most worthy treasurer of the National Division, was present and was escorted to a seat on the platform with P. M. W. Patrick Everett. Other P. G. W. occupying seats were Robert Maxwell and John D. Roberts. Mr. J. E. Hennigar, superintendent of young people's work, reported. She had written 72 letters and visited the bands. Sackville, Murray, Red Bank, Golden Falls, Bellefleur, Howard, Millstream and St. Andrews reported in young people's societies. St. John reported good work done. These reports were referred to the committee on the state of the order, as also was that of D. W. F. John Law, G. G. Grellety were received from the W. C. T. U.
