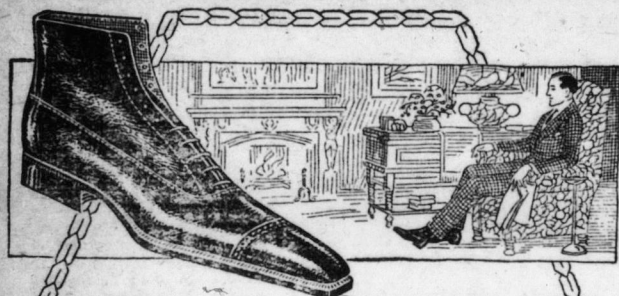

THE NEW AUTO MARKERS

The 1923 motor car markers are the reverse of 1922's in respect to color, the background being black instead of white, while the figures and letters are white. The word "Ontario" appears under the license number instead of at the side.

The same scale of license fees are in vogue this year and in addition every motorist will be required to pay one dollar for the plates. The department expects to net about \$250,000 from this additional charge, which will be used in the maintenance of Ontario's good road system.

MONEY IN DEAD LETTERS

One of the special troubles of the dead letter office staff is the ultra trustful citizen who encloses from \$10 to \$50 in a letter, signs himself Joe, Jim or Charlie, and then improperly addresses the envelope. This money nearly always finds its way into the Government treasury because the sender failed to write his own address somewhere in the body of the letter. Post office department officials say that the money from letters of this type, together with the returns from the auction sale of misdirected parcels, practically pays for the upkeep of the dead letter branch.
