VICTORIA PRICES CURRENT.

VICTORIA, V. I., JUNE 21ST, 1860.

The effect of continued arrivals of heavy supplies of goods at the mining camps in the vicinity of Fort Alexander, via the Dalles and Oregon, is felt by merchants, and trade is not so buoyant or animated as we could wish to report.

Although traders in the interior have cancelled most of their obligations, fresh orders for goods come in slowly, and until the roads from Douglas and Yale are completed, we feel satisfied that the present advantages possessed by the packer from Oregon, will render it difficult for those engaged in the business in British Columbia to compete with him. As an important move in the right direction, we are happy to note that His Excellency, Gov. Douglas, has, for the past month, in person, devoted himself with a zeal and energy to the subject of internal improvements, that merit the thanks of the country, has granted several important public privileges for the construction of roads and other public works, of vital interest to the future weal of British Columbia, and we need not add of Victoria and Vancouver's Island also.

To persons who have lived in other gold mining countries, and are conversant with the wavering and volatile disposition of miners as a class, there is one peculiar feature to be observed here this season, and while it speaks well for the present, augurs still better for the time to come, notwithstanding the natural difficulties to be contended with, in travelling through the mining country, and by no means calculated to inspire with admiration the "kid-gloved" class. The number of miners who have returned to Victoria is so trifling, that however keen this barometer of permanent success, or the contrary, is watched, it has escaped observation, for if we except a few miners, whose claims are below high water mark on the rivers, and who came here to remain until the waters subside and enable them to resume work, we know of no other arrivals, and the time having now passed for those who left here in February and March to have returned, if disappointed or unsuccessful; from that fact alone, aside from the shipments of dust increasing in amount each succeeding week, it is fair to infer that miners are doing well, and when the roads are completed, travel facilitated, cost of transportation of goods reduced, and the use of pack-saddles superseded by wagons, we know of no other country that will present equal inducements to the hardy and persevering miner, the industrious farmer or enterprising merchant, as will, British Columbia.

The market for all descriptions of goods, this week, runs very quiet; and we quote prices of most staples much lower than they were early in the fortnight. We report a large increase to the stock of Flour, arrived from Oregon, which has tended to

reduce the price, and learn that for the future, San Francisco will find a formidable rival for the Flour trade of British Columbia in her northern neighbor, who is prepared to supply the article at a figure we hardly think the dealers in San Francisco can compete with.

Since our last issue, there has been quite a movement in Cattle, and several large sales reported.

At Duncan's sale, yesterday, American Milch Cows, with Calves, sold from \$37 50 to \$80; Working Bullocks, \$120, to \$215 per pair; Yearlings, \$15 to \$25.

Imports into British Columbia, for quarter ending 31st March, 1860, amount to \$215,625,95. Imports into Port of Victoria for same period, \$538,000, from 7th, to 20th, June inclusive, \$120,337 78.

Gold shipped by express since 7th June, \$75,141.
