"of my policy to give some special attention to the Japanese. Tou "know, ih . Dryce, that in past messages to Congress. I have hade special "mention of Japan, and that I have tried to promote friendly "relations with that country." In . Bryce replied that he knew this. The President also said: "You know, too, Wr. Bryce, that I have "Slways hoped for a closer union and common understanding among the "English-speaking peoples, that in dealing with foreign powers.

"wherever it has been a question as between the British Empire." and other countries, and the parties were entitled to like con-"sideration, I have inclined towards England, and shown my sympathy "towards the British Empire. I know that in some things my policy "has been misunderstood."

The President then told Wr. Bryce of the incident he had related to he on the night previous of a conversation which one of his friends had had with Mr. Wickt in which, after a considerable amount of charpagne. It . Miyloki . in raply to the question as to what Japan intended to do with Korea had said that she would hold Korea as a possession, that when he was asked, "That about your statement that you do not intend to armor Kereaf" he had replied. "Oh, that is only politics and policy." Then he was asked about Manchuria in the same way, and had also replied that notwithstanding the statement Japan had made, her intention was to hold Manchuria, and that any statement was simply polities or policy. The President said he was afreid the Japanese did not understand the truth in "the Cocidental sense of the word;" that it was necessary to keep this in mind in dealings with them. He said, there is a difference in this regard between the English-speaking peoples and the Japanese.
