Dear Mrs. Inglin;

I have received your letter of the  
23rd ultime, and have read the same with interest  
and care.

As regards your views on the Statute  
of Westminster, they are not widely different from  
my own. As a matter of fact no actual independence  
was achieved by that Statute. We already had this  
the independence that was of any value, and have  
it still. We were a part of the Empire and are  
yet a part, and our relations with the Mother Land  
are constitutionally substantially the same as they  
have been for years.

As regards the establishment of  
another national holiday now, in the 14th year  
after the close of the War, I do not think the  
suggestion would be well received. Armistice Day -  
or as it is now called "Remembrance Day" is Canada's  
memorial holiday, commemorative of the War and the  
Canadians who took part in it.
