fire to any forest or tree on the Crown domain, or on private property on any creek, river, railway, beach or wharf.

They were also instructed to point out the loss which results to them from the destruction of timber, and to tell them that the Department regrets to hear of these fires and particularly of their alleged carelessness by leaving camp fires burning, instead of completely extinguishing them when they are going away.

To each of these agents one hundred sheets of fire notices, printed on cotton like the one inclosed, have been sent, with instructions to have them securely posted on Reserves, Islands and Mainland in conspicuous places.

It is hoped that the action taken will be productive of good results, and appreciating your interest in the matter,
