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

Thought provokes action; think of doing something, and (unconsciously, per-Thought provokes action; think of doing something, and (unconsciously, perhaps.) you begin to do it.

In the University of Wisconsin Professor Jastrow has an instrument called the automatograph, which shows very clearly and precisely the automatic movements of the hand.

It consists merely of a piece of glass resting on three moveable metal feet; or, in other words, it is a small carriage which will shift its position at the slightest movement.

At the end is a needle fixed vertically, and in contact with a roll of gaper covered with a layer of lampblack. If the apparatus moves, the movement is traced on the paper by the needle. Both paper and needle are hidden by a screen.

Professor Jastrow tells you to rest your hand upon the glass, and keep it perfectly still. This appears quite easy; but when you think your hand is quite motionless, you will find to your surprise that the needle is tracing 'ines on the paper!

The fact is, you cannot keep your hand still; unconsciously and invisibly it moves with your thoughts Look at that pair of scales; watch how the rod gives this way and that way as the scales move. Now look at the black paper; you will find that your hand has been moving exactly in agreement with the movement of the rod.
