GERMANS FAIL IN RIGHT AND CENTRE, GAIN AT OTHER POINTS

Franco-British Guns Inflict Tremendous Losses on Foe; Heavy Fighting Near Hamel and Between Luce and Avre Rivers—French Succeed in a Powerful Counter Attack

After several days of comparative inactivity along the battle front in Picardy, bitter fighting has been resumed along the western sector of the salient in the lines of the Entente Allies. On the right and centre and west of Albert the Germans were repulsed with heavy losses. The fighting, according to official reports has been the heaviest in the neighborhood of Hamel, where the British were forced back slightly, and in the triangle formed by the Rivers Luce and Avre farther to the south where the French were also forced to give ground, but where they retained important high positions, and also made a successful counter-attack between Lassigny and Montdidier. Both British and French reports emphasize the heavy losses inflicted upon the foe. There has been some heavy rain during the last day or two on the West front. The official reports are forwarded by the Canadian Press follow:

Foe Made Progress Near Hamel
 London, April 4.—Field Marshal Haig's report to-night from British Headquarters in France says:

"After heavy artillery preparation the enemy launched a strong attack this morning on the whole front between the Somme and Avre Rivers. On the right and centre of the British lines the attacking German infantry were repulsed, but on the left the weight of the assault succeeded in pressing back our troops for a short distance in the neighborhood of Hamel, on the south bank of the Somme. The fighting is continuing in this area."

"Early in the afternoon the enemy also attacked our line west of Albert, and was completely repulsed. On the French front, immediately on our right, the enemy gained ground in the angle between the River Luce and Avre."

Praise for Canadian Cavalry Brigade
 "During the past few days there has been heavy fighting south of the River Luce. A Canadian cavalry brigade greatly distinguished itself in many successful actions, both mounted and dismounted."

Germans Suffer Heavy Losses
 The earlier British report reads: "North of the Somme there is no change."

"South of the Somme the enemy launched heavy attacks early this morning on the British and French forces, and on the British front made progress in the direction of Hamel and Vaire Wood. On the remainder of the British front all attacks were beaten back with considerable loss. The fighting still continues."

Tremendous Attack Against French
 Paris, April 4.—The text of to-night's statement reads: "The battle was resumed this morning with extreme violence in the region north of Montdidier, and still continues. On a front of about fifteen kilometres (about nine miles) from Grivesnes, as far north of the road between Amiens and Reims, the Germans attacked with enormous forces, showing a firm determination to break through our front at any cost. Up to the present we have identified by prisoners eleven enemy divisions."

Well Over 100,000 Men
 "Our troops with intrepid courage resisted the shock of the assaulting masses, who were mowed down by our artillery fire."

"Despite their efforts, ten times repeated, the Germans succeeded, in gaining only a few hundred metres of terrain, and occupying the villages of Mailly, Anval and Morisel, the neighboring heights of which we hold."

Counter-Attack Meets With Success
 "Grivesnes, which was attacked with particular violence, remained in our hands."

"Between Montdidier and Lassigny there was great activity by the two armies. By a powerful counter-attack the French made progress at this point."

Fresh Successes, Says Berlin
 Berlin, April 4 (via London).—The report from General Headquarters this evening says:

"During the continuation of our attack south of the Somme, fresh successes have been won."

"As reprisals for the French bombardment of our shelters in last night's past few days, the Germans have been subjected to our fire."

"By means of surprise and after strong artillery preparation, the enemy, during the early morning and afternoon, four times vainly endeavored to recapture heights wrested from him southwest of Morisel. This attack broke down with heavy losses."

French Defeats Near of Battle
 Paris, April 4.—After a short Easter recess the Deputies came to the Chamber to-day in large numbers, more interested in the military situation than in the discussion of bills. The recrudescence of artillery duels, mentioned in the latest official statements and confirmed earlier in the day by Field Marshal Haig, Under-Secretary of Military Justice and Pension, was considered as the prelude to another great battle."

Toward the end of the afternoon further details reached the Chamber. M. Ignace told the members that the battle had been raging on an eighteen-mile front between Grivesnes and Hamel, and that eleven German divisions had been repulsed by the French. M. Ignace added that the importance of this action ought not to be exaggerated, for though a brilliantly successful engagement, it was local in character."

NORMANDY WILL BE INDUSTRY CENTRE

Big Future After the War Looms Over This French Province

Paris, April 4.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Normandy is believed to be destined to become one of the great centres of French industrial activity as soon as hostilities have ceased. One metallurgical company, working under the auspices of the French Government, already has taken the matter in hand, and is constructing a large series of blast furnaces to turn into steel the immense layers of iron ore found in Lower Normandy.

Just before the war the whole region with its mineral wealth was in danger of falling into the hands of the Germans, as Thyssen, one of the German steel kings, had acquired the Soumont mine, about fifteen miles from Caen, with the intention of working it in connection with blast furnaces he proposed to construct in the vicinity of that city.

His idea was to furnish coal from his Westphalian mines, and to obtain iron ore for the German blast furnaces along the Rhine.

Thyssen was unable to obtain a concession for the construction of a railroad from the mine to the port of Caen, except on the condition of uniting his interests to those of a French company. This condition was accepted and the company was formed which at the end of 1912 started important works on the right banks of the River Orne.

Ten million dollars had been expended when the work was interrupted by the war and the port was longingly to Thyssen sequestered. The French Government thereupon, in view of the great demand for cast iron and steel for the purposes of the army, decided to step in and hasten the construction of the works. The two great national armaments

works, Creusot, and Saint-Chamond, interested themselves in the project and established a new company, which now has works covering more than 1,100 acres near Caen.

A blast furnace, connecting the works with the Soumont ore mine, 15 miles distant. From these mines, it is expected, iron ore will be obtainable for an indefinite period. With coal will be brought from England for the present and later from the northern departments of France and from Belgium by canal. Shuttles are also in progress for the discovery of the prolongation of the English coal layers.

The works are now employed on munitions for the French army, but as soon as the war has terminated they will be utilized to turn the district into a gigantic steel works and transform the province into an industrial centre.

"CORPSE SHIP"
 (Associated Press.)
 Bagdad, April 4.—In the land of strange things strikes the European visitor so strangely as the "corpse ship." It is a huge barge piled high with native corpses, many of them several years old, which are being carried down the river to rest in a cemetery near the wall of the city.

The bodies are piled on a deck, packed tight in straw, and on top of which the Arab attendants sit nonchalantly and play a native game resembling dominoes. Some of the corpses are comparatively new, others old. It is difficult to know how long it took the family of the deceased to save enough money to pay the cost of transportation.
