## Lunenburg Board of Trade.

The Annual Meeting, of the Lunenburg Board of Trade, was held in the Town Council Chamber at 9.30 a. m. on Thursday 12th inst.—D. M. Owen Esq. President in the chair—and the minutes of the previous meeting having been read and approved, the President, presented his Annual Report, reviewing in part the work of the past year, and containing valuable suggestions for the future. It was on motion, and the unanimous vote of the Board, received and adopted and by a subsequent resolution, ordered to be printed in the local papers.

Following is the Report.  
To the Lunenburg Board of Trade, Gentlemen

The flight of time, which each year as we grow older seems more rapid than ever before, has again ushered us into a new year, with all its opportunities and possibilities and brought us to the date of yet another annual meeting to which it is a great pleasure to bid you all welcome.

That we have many causes for thankfulness in looking back upon the year that is gone, cannot be gainsaid and it is a significant fact, speaking well for the favored land in which we dwell, that the congratulations extended to you in last year's Report respecting the healthy and peaceful conditions which had for the year therefore prevailed in this Town and County, can with equal good cause be offered to you on the present occasion.

Except in occasional cases the fisheries during the past season have not proven a success, the phenomenally high prices have however helped out well, and strange to say, the merchants and Banks, report quite favorably as to general financial conditions.

It is said by some who profess to have made a study of the matter, that with the new and rapidly extending markets for fish, prices in the future are bound to keep well up. Let us hope this may be so, and for a few good years of better catches.

The changed conditions which now attend the trade between this Port and the West Indies, and other markets, and the fact that a large proportion of our shipments, is made by steamers starting from the Port of Halifax involving the expense and inconvenience to our merchants of first forwarding the same to Halifax, and having them there reloaded, and the additional fact that in consequence of this inconvenience, many of our fish are sold out and out to Halifax parties, who thus reap the profits of the foreign sale, make it highly desirable that this state of affairs be changed.

This remedy appears within easy view. The importance of the Lunenburg fish trade calls for the touching here of a steamer subsidized for the West India Service, and incidentally for the dredging of this harbor. The subsidy of the Pickford & Black Line, expires during the coming summer, and I would respectfully suggest, that the strongest possible appeal be made to the Federal Govt. backed

up, if possible by a delegation of our Lunenburg, Malbone Bay, Getson's Cove, and Riverport Fish Merchants, and others, urging that the resubsidation of the W. I. Service be conditioned for the recognition of Lunenburg as a Port of regular call, a proposition rendered easily feasible by the present competition of several substantial Companies of the subsidy.

With this object attained, and the fish now sold in Halifax, disposed of, direct to West India Dealers, we should also enjoy the benefits of the employment involved in putting them up here, including the manufacture of the requisite packages and then besides, with cold storage here, and on board steamers, a fresh fish business could also be opened up, and no doubt other enterprises in same connection would follow.

I trust the Board will give the subject the enthusiastic attention it appears to me to so plainly call for.

It is pleasing to again advert to the fact that the Board's resolution approving of the Hon. Joseph Chamberlain's Fiscal Policy, for the encouragement of preferential trade arrangements throughout the British Empire, and forwarded to him, met with a most hearty acknowledgement, and response, over his own autograph signature.

With respect to the Railway connection with the settlements on lower parts of LaHave River—Riverport etc. the Board is already aware of the work done, and efforts made in that direction, and that we have assurances from Governmental quarters, that the claims of these sections will not be overlooked.

Following upon the Board's Resolution regarding the objectionable condition of the Halifax & South Western Railway Station here, and the forwarding of same to the manager at Bridgewater, came his courteous reply, and desirable improvements have since been made

with others to follow.

It is a matter for congratulation that, that portion of the Railway between Halifax and Liverpool is practically finished, and will soon be in active operation, with the reasonable prospect of the early accomplishment of its western extension.

The improved Fire Alarm System for the Town, for which we have so long been agitating, has been fully endorsed by the Corporation, and what appears to be a desirable and efficient Electric Alarm System, settled upon and contracted for.

The only difficulty now appears to be the coming to terms with the Nova Scotia Telegraphic and Lunenburg Gas Co, which beside other conditions, are I understand holding out for a certain annual rental for use of their posts etc. which the corporation has not yet seen its way clear, to arrange to pay.

It is hoped, in view of the addition
