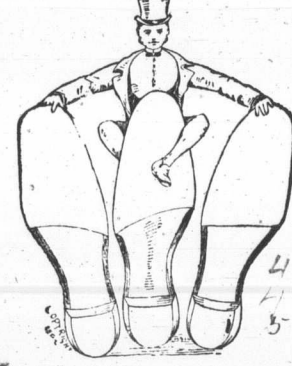

Cut-Ridged Butter Fakers. Misdirected letters falling into the hands of the post office department reveal the latest device for the defrauding of farmers. Gilt-edged but consists of three cents worth of peeps sold at \$1.50. The farmer is directed to take a pint of sweet milk and as much of the "compound" as he can heap on a silver dime. On motion, John B. Barry was appointed to have charge of the management of ticket sellers and gate keepers and have charge of the tickets of admission. Decided, that all exhibitors of stock be allowed one herdman's ticket for from 4 to 8 head of stock and two tickets for 8 head or over. Complimentary tickets of admission were ordered to be sent to the press, clergymen, and all parties who contributed \$5 or over to the special prize fund. E. Davis was appointed to arrange for hay and straw for stock. Board then adjourned to meet on Sep. 4th, at 1 p. m.

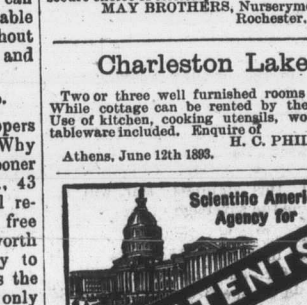

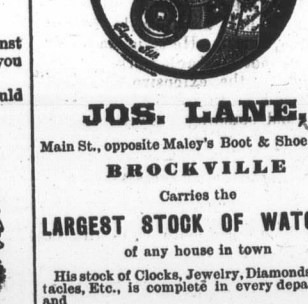

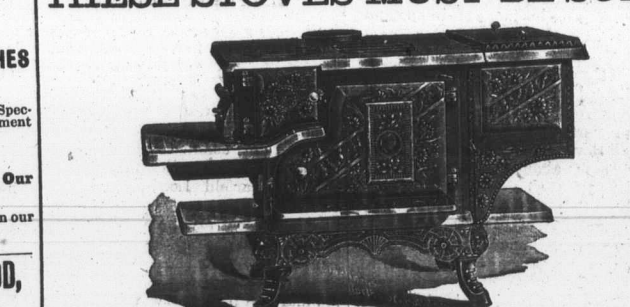
