A COSTLY BLAZE

Two Houses Almost Completely Destroyed by Fire—System Out of Order

A costly fire took place on Degge street to-day at noon; one house being burned to the ground, and another gutted by the flames.

The fire alarm system in that portion of the city was out of working order, but the residents did not at first think of this, and it was only after receiving no response to repeated pulls at the alarm box nearby that anyone thought of notifying the fire department by telephone.

When the brigade arrived, the flames had too great a start to allow the saving of a great deal of either of the burning houses.

The house burned to the ground was the property of J. W. White, and was occupied by Mr. Cooper, a colored plasterer. The other house, which was badly damaged inside by the flames, was occupied by the Misses Huffman.

Until the fire alarm system is put in good working order once more, it would be well as a precautionary measure, for citizens living in distant parts of the city to notify the department in case of fire, by telephone as well as by alarm.

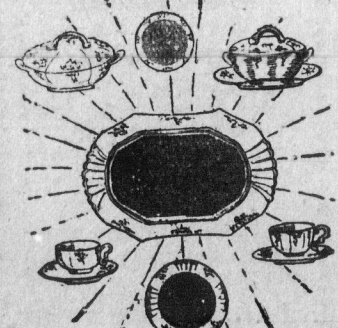
