Ottawa, Jan. 18.—Returns received at the Trade and Commerce Department from Winnipeg show that 10,000,000 bushels of grain found its way to Buffalo last season as compared with 4,000,000 the year previous. The principal reason for this was that the Canadian facilities were not equal to handling it.

DEATH'S CALL

Herman Eberts Passed Away in the Far West After Very Short Illness

The proprietor of The Planet received the following C. P. R. telegram this morning, bearing its sad news:

Herman Eberts died here to-night, hospital, acute pneumonia, aged 64 years, only ill few days. Funeral here on Friday.

R. E. GOSNELL.

Both Mr. Gosnell, who kindly sent the despatch, and Mr. Eberts, whose sad demise is chronicled, were former editors of The Planet.

Herman Joseph Eberts was a former resident of this city and is highly esteemed here by all who knew him. He is a barrister-at-law. He was twice married, first to Sarah Mary Gilbert, daughter of Edward Urquhart, who passed away June 16th, 1897, and two years later to Isabel Richmond, daughter of William Henry Hooper, who survives. One son and three daughters are also left to mourn his loss.

The deceased was very popular and highly respected and many Maple City friends will mourn the sad news.

PACKERS CLOSE DOWN.

Blame Government's Hog Quarantine Regulations and Change re. Bonding.

Ottawa, Jan. 18.—The George Matthews Co., the big pork packing establishment of Hull, announces that it is compelled to curtail the output of its factory owing to restrictions imposed by the Dominion Government regarding the importation of hogs from the United States.

About forty men are thus thrown out of employment.

Owing to the prevalence of hog cholera on the other side, the Department of Agriculture issued a quarantine regulation which has the effect of barring out hogs purchased there, and the Canadian supply is unequal. To this is added the withdrawal of the bonding privilege.
