not allowed to run on the highways of this Municipality on Saturday and Sunday of each week.

The motion passed after a long discussion.

Coun. Parker moved that P. Innis, Esq., be appointed appraiser for the Municipality for lands taken for right-of-way, etc., for Centreville to Weston branch of the Dominion Atlantic Railway.

Mr. Ross Chipman and Mr. A. S. Macdonald were also nominated.

On the first ballot Mr. Macdonald had seven votes, Mr. Innis five and Mr. Chipman three.

A second ballot showed eight votes for Mr. Macdonald and seven for Mr. Innis, and Mr. Macdonald was declared elected appraiser.

Couns. Parker and Hamilton filed notice of reconsideration at the next meeting of Council.

Solicitor Roscoe spoke in reference to the outbreak of smallpox in Ward 9. There had been seventy cases with but one death. Disinfection and fumigation have been attended to with the exception of one building, a combined house and barn affording shelter for a family of ten persons, two cows and a horse. The family have recovered from the disease, but, as it was impossible to disinfect the building, they were not allowed to go among the neighbors, working for whom was their chief means of livelihood. It had been proposed that the building should be burned. This he thought, neither Health Officer nor Council had power to order without the consent of the owner. This consent might be obtained for a consideration.

After a prolonged discussion it was resolved that Couns. Hamilton, Anderson and Griffin be a committee to investigate the matter and take such action as seemed to them wise.

Messrs. J. D. Martin, Edgar L. Foster and Levi R. Clarke were appointed a Board of Revision and Appeal.

Council adjourned to Friday, May 27th at 11 o'clock.

Handling Cookies.

Life Expectancy of the Man Who Drinks.
It is generally known that total abstainers are better insurance risks than those who drink liquor to any degree, but perhaps there are not many unfamiliar with the insurance business who have any idea to what extent this is true. A certain Dr. Newsholme has been making a computation based upon the figures in possession of a great many British life companies, and his statements will no doubt be startling to some. He has found that, averaging the figures furnished by all the companies examined, the death rate for non-abstainers is never less than 5 per cent to 55 years than 45 per cent, higher than that of abstainers. At some ages prior to the 55 years it even reaches 90 per cent. higher. After 55 years of age the percentage of difference between the drinker and the non-drinker gradually decreases, but even between 60 and 65 years there is a difference of 32 per cent in favor of the total abstainer. Putting the matter another way out of every 100,000 abstainers at the age of 20 years, 53,044 are due to reach 70 years, while out of the same number of drinkers only 42,109 are due to reach the same age. These figures, of course, are absolutely actual, and are propounded. When we think of the non-abstainers not collected in the interests of any temperance in mind those who drink to any extent whatever, these figures are certainly startling enough.—Ex
