FISH AND GAME ASSOCIATION

The members of the Fish and Game Association met in the Town Hall, Woodstock, at 2 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. This association was organized in Woodstock on March 27, last.

Dr. Macintosh, the president, was in the chair, and the secretary, P. S. Marsten, was also at his desk. There was a fairly large attendance, including Harry Craig, the youngest member, aged 12 years, son of W. C. Craig of Hartland. Among those present were Woodford Craig, G. W. Slipp, Wm. Johnston, W. L. Mersereau, Fred Grant, Dr. Clarke, Dr. McIntosh, A. Watson, Mr. Bull, J. E. Cogger, P. Cox, Russel Boyer, Rev. L. A. Fenwick, Frank Brown, Mr. Emery, Mr. Jones (Lakeville), Charles Clarke, George Y. Jones, P. S. Marsten, Dr. Grant and John P. Malaney.

The president said that this was a bad time of year for a large attendance, as the motoring is bad and he himself had to travel through the mud

by motor to get here. Since the meeting the secretary had been very active and he had secured much valuable information in connection with the protection of forest, fish and game.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

P. S. Marsten—The membership is now 115; receipts \$115, of which \$104.85 are in the Bank of Nova Scotia, and \$8 on hand; the expenditure was very light.

The president said that the present membership was chiefly in Woodstock and its neighborhood, but thought that the membership would be about 250 before the end of the summer.

On motion of Mr. Slipp, seconded by Dr. Clarke, the report of the secretary was adopted.

Moved by Dr. N. P. Grant, seconded by G. W. Slipp, that we affiliate with the N. B. Fish and Game Protective Association Limited.

Carried.

Moved by Rev. L. A. Fenwick, seconded by G. W. Slipp, that we endorse the action of the president and secretary in their protest against leasing to private individuals East, Long and Rocky Lakes in Charlotte county.

Carried.

Moved by P. S. Marsten, seconded by Rev. L. A. Fenwick that a committee of three be appointed to check on the constitution and by laws, offer suggestions, etc., and communicate the same to the N. B. Association in St. John.

Letters were read from Messrs. Gagnon and Harrison promising co-operation.

Dr. Grant, Dr. Clarke and P. S. Marsten were appointed a committee to check up the proposed provincial constitution.

The president stated that Mr. Jas. Egan, of St. John, a dominion government fish expert, would be here shortly and look over our fishing resorts with the intention of stocking them with fry. The members suggested the following streams for stocking purposes: "Charlie Lake, Skiff Lake, Ayer's Lake, Meduxnakik, Coldstream, Eel River, Fox Lake, Shogomoc, Indian Lake, Gibson Branch, Kilmarnock, Salmon Brook, Bedell Brook, etc.

Mr. Jones Williamstown Lake is the largest body of water in Carleton county. I wonder if the government could supply that lake with black bass? Would black bass be suitable for the lake?

Mr. Mersereau I think the government could supply anything but pickered.

Mr. Jones We want no pickered in that lake.

Voted that the government be requested to appoint a fish, fire and game warden for the Beauséjour, its tributaries.

Moved by Dr. Grant, seconded by Russel Boyer, that we co-operate with the officials in the protection of the streams from pollution, and not by Mr. Mersereau of any contemplated mills to be erected in the streams.

Carried.

Moved by Dr. Clarke, seconded by Mr. Craig, that the secretary write to Hon. W. E. Foster, the Canadian representative on the Waterways Commission, asking him to look into the matter of the pollution of international streams through Maine, which is of much more importance to this district than to any other part of the province.

Voted that the secretary write to the provincial government to allow the federal department officials to make arrests of offenders and power to issue licenses.

Inasmuch as the N. B. Association signified its willingness to allow this Club to nominate one or all of the provincial officers, it was moved by Mr. Marsten, seconded by Dr. Clarke, that this meeting request the secretary to write to the provincial provincial officers that we recommend that our president, Dr. McIntosh, be our representative on the provincial board.

Carried.

Voted that the secretary prepare a set of resolutions of condolence to be presented to G. W. Slipp and A. L. Slipp on the death of their son and brother.

Dr. Clarke said that Claude Knapp in an interview to a reporter said that moose were more plentiful than ever before. If Mr. Knapp was correctly reported, he is mistaken. Where there were ten moose only a few years ago, there are but three now, unless they have moved to Mr. Knapp's territory on the Tobique. Even on the Tobique the speaker was informed that one of the guides was considering moving from the Tobique to Quebec where there would be better business.

Voted that we firmly believe that a game preserve should be established in this province so that moose, which in the opinion of this Club is getting scarce, may have an opportunity to increase.

Voted that the secretary be given power to order necessary stationery and make inquiries as to the cost of 50 Posters in tin or a large number in cotton or paper, with hunting and fishing information about the migratory bird act.
