VAN DERBILT IN SARATOGA.
**How the Millionaire Drives his Famous
Stand S. and Other Trotters.**
A smooth road leads out from this vil-
lage past the famous race course four
miles to Saratoga Lake. This is where
most of the pleasure driving by summer
Saratogans is done. Tally-ho coaches,
tandem teams, and other freaks of equi-
page are here common on pleasant after-
noons. But nothing in the show attracts
so much gazing as Vanderbilt and the
horses that draw him. They are Maud S.,
Early Rose, and Alkino, harnessed singly
or in pairs. They are hitched to a neat,
plain road wagon. In it alone sits Van-
derbilt. He appears to have regarded his
experiment in clean shaving as unsatis-
factory, for he has let the former whiskers
grow again on the sides of his face, and
thus has resumed a resemblance to his
familiar portraits. He wears a high white
hat with a black band, a gray duster but-
toned up to the chin, and altogether has
a turfy aspect, not to say a rakish one.
"How fast is he going?" was asked of
an expert, as the millionaire dashed past
behind Maud S.
"Oh, possibly a three minute gait, but
surely not faster," was the reply; "and
he is getting the very best he can out of
her. See him touch her with the tip of
his whip? That's all the incitement she
needs. The road is as good as the track
was that she made her best record on,
and all the conditions are as favorable—
except one. Bairn isn't holding the ribbons.
Vanderbilt can't begin to get the speed
out of his horses that his hired driver and
trainer can. It is hard to tell why."
Mr. Vanderbilt's trotters are here in
Saratoga his almost exclusive diversion.
Driving is to him so absorbingly pleasur-
able that he very rarely takes a compani-
on along. His youngest daughter, Mrs.
Webb, has been ill, and once or twice he
has shared the seat of his road wagon with
her; but he prefers to go alone, though
companionable enough—even approach-
able by strangers if they try to talk about
nothing else than horses. The trouble
about his conversation on these chance
occasions is that, like many another turf-
man, he seems to say whatever happens
to come into his head at the moment of
special enthusiasm.
"I notice that J. I. Case is in town,"
was said to him. "Has he tried to get up
a match between Jay-Eye-See and your
mare?"
"My mare will never again be driven
except by me on the road," he positively
replied. "I am satisfied with what she
has done, and what she is doing, and I
shall make no matches."

On the other hand, a man of undoubt-
ed veracity reports him explicitly as say-
ing that Mr. Case could arrange a race
without difficulty, but this was when he
was being chaffed by a friend as to the
relative qualities of the beasts.
Toward the rear end of the United
States Hotel garden the ground rises to a
moderate knoll, and the trees are thick
evergreens, so that a section of the im-
mense building is screened off from the
rest of the premises, though perfectly ac-
cessible. This part is divided in fifty-foot
double residences called cottages. Al-
though externally in architectural har-
mony with the rest, they are disconnect-
ed as to hallways, and afford to their
inmates a slight degree of privacy. They
are five stories high. The Vanderbilts
use one of these "cottages." The party
includes the Sloans, the Webbs, and the
Twombleys—daughters, sons-in-law, and
grandchildren—and a numerous retinue
of servants. The Vanderbilt ladies mix
with the guests of the hotel quite indistin-
guishably. William H. is the only
Vanderbilt who is generally known about
the place. Their conduct is quiet and
polite. Meals are served in their own
rooms, and all the special cooking for
them is done under the supervision of
their \$10,000 French expert, who is fully
privileged in the hotel kitchen. Their
servants are their own, even to the cham-
bermaids; and most of their victuals and
drink are brought by their special caterer.
A small iron box of jewelry is lugged every
night, under guard, from the Vanderbilt
cottage to the safe in the hotel.

A German Warning to England.
BERLIN, Aug. 14.—In reply to a recent
article in the London Times, which inti-
mated that Prince Bismarck was in a fit of
ill humor with England, which would
probably soon pass away, the North Ger-
man Gazette says: "Germany has for
years supported the English policy in the
most unselfish manner. She has received
no return for this except malevolence
in the treatment of German interests
abroad on the part of both England and
her colonies. Germany has always, and
especially in the Angra Pequena matter,
acted in friendship for England. Such
friendships, however, when one sided,
must, of course, collapse. Should Eng-
land not modify her policy toward Ger-
man interests abroad the 'fit of ill humor'

might grow to a permanent ill feeling.
German policy in the future will be friend-
ly to friends, but adverse to those who
unwarrantably injure German interests."

NEWS SUMMARY.
In the department of dress at the Lon-
don Health Exhibition there is a most
useful exhibit, according to the corres-
pondent of a New York doctor, relating
to special dresses for particular occupa-
tions. Among others there are displayed
suits for women engaged in the care of
machines where gearing or belting is
used, dresses for use in lead, wall paper,
Paris green and other factories, and es-
pecially the so-called "breathing" dress,
to enable persons to work in noxious
gases. A curious exhibit is an asbestos
fire-proof dress, which, according to the
account, appears to be destined to a use-
ful career, as with its aid one may pass
through fire without even discomfort.

A very mysterious story is now exciting
the readers of the Norddeutsche Allgemeine
Zeitung. On a certain evening recently
a man named B. was sitting at supper
with his wife in his home in the Nurnber-
ger strass, Leipzig, when he heard a ring
at the outer door, and the servant being
absent, went to see who was there.
When he returned he had, apparently
lost his appetite; but he declined to give
any explanation as to who had summoned
him. In a short time the bell rang again.
Mrs. B. went to the door, where she found
an unknown man, who desired to speak
to the master of the house. B. upon be-
ing informed of this, went out once more;
but, as he did not come back, his wife
became uneasy and began to search for
him. She discovered no trace of her
husband either in the hall or in the
street; but in a small room, the door of
which was locked from the inside and
had to be forced open, she found him
suspended by the neck from a gas bracket
by means of a silk handkerchief. She
rushed to the street door to cry for
assistance, and was there confronted by
the unknown man. He at once entered
and out down the body of Mr. B., who
was however, quite dead. When the
police arrived the unknown man had dis-
appeared, and all efforts to find him since
have been unavailing. He is said to be
about thirty years of age, prepossessing in
appearance, and of gentlemanly address.
The deceased was in his fifty-fifth year,
and, as he was in comfortable circum-
stances and on good terms with his wife,
the motive which impelled him to take
his own life remains a mystery.

Fruit Dryers and "Evaporators."
Those who have hot-bed sashes can
dry fruit by the heat of the sun in a
manner vastly superior to the ordinary
method. A box should be made like a
hot-bed frame, but with a bottom, and it
should have legs to raise it a few inches
from the ground. The sashes should fit
closely to keep out dust and insects. In
the front of the box, at the bottom, make
openings under the middle of each sash,
and at the rear make similar openings at
the top. We do not recollect the exact
size we used, but probably twelve inches
long by three wide will answer. These
openings should be covered with wire
cloth, though in its absence mosquito
netting or a similar stuff will answer. The
fruit, or other article to be dried, should
be upon trays or frames covered with
some coarse fabric, and raised a
few inches from the bottom of
the box. The sash being so placed
as to catch the full heat of the sun, the
drying will go on in a surprising manner.
The air passing in at the lower openings
will become quickly heated, and going
out at the upper openings a current will
be established, carrying off the moisture
from the fruit, etc., in the most satisfac-
tory manner. The product will not be so
white when dried by artificial heat but
for home use just as good, and it will be
free from dust and the soiling by insects.
We have dried the finest sweet corn im-
aginable with a contrivance like this, and
have no doubt of its efficacy in drying
fruit.—American Agriculturist.

**Mr. Stanley Going to Convert the Eng-
lish.**
PARIS, Aug. 14.—Mr. Henry M. Stanley,
the African explorer, who is now in this
city, has been conversing freely with an
interviewer. He declared that the Congo
Free State would soon be recognized by
the whole world. The State proposes to
give open commerce to all nations and
expects to become a great federation of
native chiefs under the control of a
European and American commission.
Mr. Stanley said that he would soon visit
London and convert the English, who now
stand alone in their opposition to his
project. He praised M. De Brazza, the
French explorer, who, he said, was des-
tined to render great service to France.
