## Wants War Continued.

Lieut. General Linevitch Wishes to Fight to the Bitter End.

Headquarters of the Russian Army Godzyadani, Manchuria, June 6.—Undismayed by Rojestvensky's defeat and full of confidence as to the outcome of the approaching battle, Lieut. General Linevitch is for war to the bitter end, and he believes that the Manchuria army is now strong enough to assume the aggressive.

To a question put to him by the correspondent of the Associated Press to whom he granted an interview today, as to whether he was for war or peace, the commander-in-chief replied firmly and without the slightest hesitation:—

'Most certainly I am for war. I am a soldier. The emperor's will is naturally my law, but my voice now, as before, is for the continuance of the fight.'

'With the destruction of our fleet vanishes, of course, the hope of those who at the beginning of the war wished to make peace at Tokio, but our defeat at sea has not interfered with my plans—absolutely not one whit. I consider myself strong enough now not only to hold my ground, but even in advance.'

'I am no prophet and have no desire to be one, but I firmly believe that I can and will defeat the Japanese in Manchuria.'

'I have asked the war office to send me reservists of the youngest classes instead of older ones, not because the latter make poor soldiers, not because with plenty of young and vigorous reservists it would be unjust as well as inadvisable to call the older men from their more settled life.'

## TOGO USED SUBMARINES.

London, June 7.—The correspondent at Tokio of the Daily Telegraph says:

It is officially stated that submarines actually were used in the Togo Strait battle.

It transpires that after the Russian battleship Orvi surrounded some Russian officers and sailors tried to blow up the vessel. Japanese discovered the attempt and eight of the ringleaders were shot.

During the battle Admiral Togo on the Mikasa, displayed admirable coolness. The Mikasa, approached nearer the Russians than any other battleship.

## RUSSIAN CABINET FAVORS PEACE.

Paris, June 6.—A despatch to the semi-official Temps from St. Petersburg filed at 1 o'clock this afternoon, says: It is learned from an authoritative source that the unanimous efforts of the ministers are directed toward peace and that they hope to succeed shortly.

## TREPOFF A 'DICTATOR.'

St. Petersburg, June 6.—Summarizing the recent imperial ukase appointing Trepoff as assistant minister of the interior, the Stovo declares it practically creates a police dictatorship over all the ministers, revives the famous third section and by giving Trepoff plenipotentiary power to close societies, conventions, leagues and assemblies of every character at will makes him the final arbiter of the entire public life of Russia.

The Stovo's article is considered the more remarkable as the paper is the organ of M. Shipoff, (former president of the Moscow Zemstvo).

Prince Meshchensky, in the Grashdanin affirms that the appointment is worse than the military dictatorship advocated by the Moscow Gazette. He says:

We all recall this black hour. The dictatorship of 1880 led to the March 1 of 1881 (the assassination of Alexander II.)

The Liberals see in the decision to restrict the electors to property owners on the basis of the law of 1864 a deliberate intention to exclude the 'intelligentsia' and provisional classes, especially the Jews who have no property and workmen who will be obliged to go back to their villages in order to secure the franchise.

## CANADA AND THE EMPIRE

The London Outlook referring to the imprisonment of a crew of Canadian sealers by the government of Uruguay, quoted a Canadian newspaper in saying 'It seems to us we should cut a rather comical figure in asking Britain to thrash Uruguay.'

In such an utterance, says the Outlook, may be discerned the growth of a sense of nationality and national self-respect, which must sooner or later constrain Canada to assume a share of the burden of Imperial defence.

Canada is a nation and must have her national fleet at the disposal of the Empire. It is astonishing how Englishmen ignore the greatness of the Dominion, which is rapidly growing to a state of world power.

Lord Grey's address in Toronto should be re-printed and scattered broadcast over the United Kingdom, in order that the motives of the Canadian policy might better be understood.

Having noticed in your last issue a desire to get news such as would interest the public we take the opportunity of sending something for your readers.

The weather is quite dry and the time for forest fires is now on us, it stands all in how to be careful of our wood resources. Nothing but the utmost vigilance will save our forests which are the chief resources of our country. We would suggest that printed circulars be handed to our railroad people to use every care, especially engineers, warning them to keep their engines in places that are most liable to be set on fire. Also it should be made a part of school education, teaching children the necessity of using every care to save the forest not only in theory, but in practice, especially on Arbor day. We have noticed on that day teachers and scholars industriously clearing the winter chips and rubbish, carrying it at a safe distance from the schools and setting the same on fire to the great danger of communicating the fire to the adjoining forest, and at that particular time of the year everything combustible appears to just be waiting for a spark. It looks as if the teaching should begin at the Normal school and then the teacher would be in a position to impart the knowledge of care to the scholars. Some times teachers accompanied by the children with lunch baskets going to the woods make a small fire to make tea, not understanding how liable a fire is to start up when all are gone home and spread to the adjoining forest and work terrible havoc. The usual exclamation would be we did not think it would spread we thought we put it all out before we left. This is all we will say on this matter just now, we will speak more of this at another time.

The thing just now taking up the public mind in our town is the preparation for a Monster gathering of people on the July 30th, in Doaktown. Friends will meet on that day that have not met for years. The Railroad rats will be the lowest on record. The grounds for the meeting will be near the Railway station. All the Hotels will be fully prepared but the special tables and fruit stands will be in the open. Brass Bands will be in attendance games, Base Ball and aquatic sports will be the order of the day. The finest looking men and women of the province will be there. Good order and humor will prevail. Nothing stronger than tea and Soda water will be drunk.
