Flammarion, the great French scientist, published in 1905 a list of different kinds of trees, showing the number of times each species had been struck by lightning during a given period. The figures are: 54 oaks, 24 poplars, 14 clms, 11 walnuts, 10 firs, 7 willows, 6 beeches, 4 chestnuts, but not a single birch.
