Government stipulates to give to the two tribes, for a limited period of time, an annuity, in goods suitable to their necessities, of \$10,000 per annum, with sundry other stipulations of minor import.

When the risk of using gas, the trouble and expense of oil, independent of the danger of scorching dresses and furniture—as well as the continuous waste of candles, by opening and shutting doors, draughts, &c.—are taken into consideration, there can be, we believe, but one opinion as to the economy of gas light over every other species of illumination; and as it has succeeded everywhere it has been tried, we think there is little doubt but that in the lapse of a few months, we shall in Charlottetown not only have every house, shop and public building, but also our most populous streets lighted with gas, and thus become, by degrees, more assimilated to other towns and cities.
