in St. John on TUESDAY, WEDNES-
DAY, THURSDAY and FRIDAY, the
5th, 6th, 7th and 8th of
OCTOBER NEXT.
The splendid new and permanent Ex-
hibition-Building, erected on the Bar-
rack Grounds, in connexion with the
extensive Drill Shed and commodious
New Sheds and Stalls for Stock, will
afford ample accommodation and pro-
tection for all exhibits.
The Deep-Water Terminal of the
Intercolonial Railroad is close to the
Exhibition Grounds, and goods and stock
will be landed from cars or steamboats
and placed on exhibition with very little
trouble or expense.
A limited number of care-takers of
Live Stock will be passed free to and
from St. John.

EXHIBITORS
will be required to pay the freight from
any part within the Province to St. John,
one-half of which will be refunded to
them upon presentation of the freight
bill, and an order will be issued for its
return free, provided it has not been sold

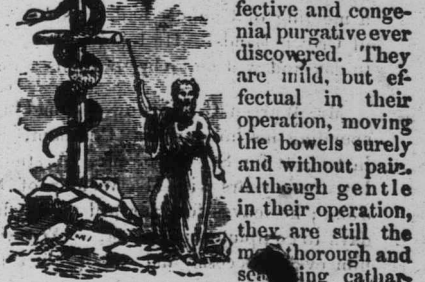
