A NEW S. S. FREIGHT LINE.

The Norwegian-America Line proposes establishing a regular freight line between Norway and Canada, in conjunction with the C. P. R. The ships will run from Montreal in the summer and from St. John in winter. The first boat will commence operating in October, and a monthly route will be established thereafter. A Norwegian newspaper says:—Canada is a country with great possibilities and its export trade has a considerable market here, chiefly grain and other farming products, sugar, farm implements, and canned salmon. On the other hand there are a great many Norwegians living in Canada who want Norwegian goods, especially Norwegian canned fish which has a good market there.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. B. Daggett of Marysville, with whom the bride made her home for many years.

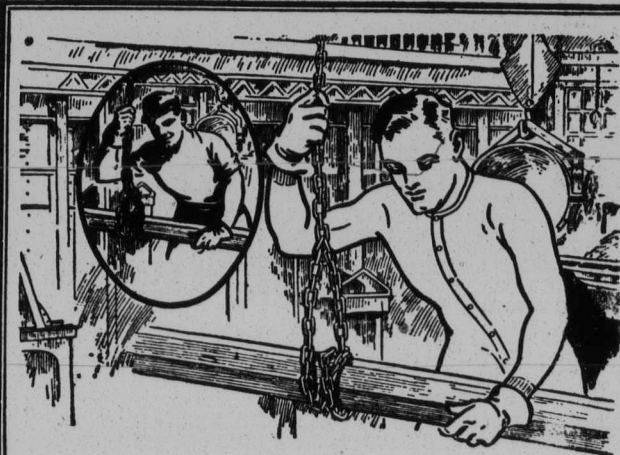
