DISEASES OF BEANS

Bean Mosaic is one of the numerous hereditary and infectious plant diseases which have come into prominence during the last few years. It has caused considerable loss in the bean growing district of Southern Ontario and has been noted in Manitoba, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

The leaves of infected plants show irregular mottled and crinkled or puckered areas. The raised or crinkled area is of a normal green and the remainder of the leaf smooth and of a dry yellow-green colour. At first only a small portion may be of the whole leaf and perhaps all the leaves on the plant assume the same shade and texture. Infected plants are usually small and readily crowded out or hidden by the more vigorous, healthy ones.

Under normal field conditions, the plants may have been infected late in the season and the pods produced are usually small. This naturally greatly reduces the yield, depending on the percentage of infected plants in the field. Diseased plants, however, are found producing

normal or nearly normal yields. These plants may have been infected late in the growing season, seed from diseased plants is usually but not invariably infected, and products of diseased plants. Such seed has a low germinating quality and frequently produces weak plants. Sufficient is known concerning the loss which may be caused by this disease to justify every grower in taking precautions to avoid and eliminate it.

It is carried in the seed from year to year and spreads from diseased to healthy plants under field conditions. Just how this transmission takes place is not known. However, it can be transferred by crushing diseased leaves and then rubbing the extracted juice on the leaves of healthy plants. As this can be done quite readily it is possible that it may be spread by pickers, cultivating machinery or possibly by insects.

Control

In view of the fact that diseased plants produce seed carrying the virus, which in turn produces diseased plants, and that the disease spreads in the field under normal conditions, there are certain precautions which should be taken until more satisfactory methods have been discovered. The grower should obtain his seed from fields or stock which was not infected the previous season. If he does not know of a disease free field he should obtain it from exceptionally high yielding fields. Following this, he should go over his seed producing field repeatedly during the summer, removing all diseased or weak plants. He will also gain advantage by selecting his seed from healthy, vigorous, high-yielding plants.

Hand-selection of seed, seed treatments or spraying will not control the disease.

The football field forms the only outlet for them with the open air and physical sport possible for thousands of men tied to the office desk or the factory bench. In the old days, the religious spirit, cutting through the material, people, it is true, prefer the sordid drama of a murder story or a scandal to general accounts of international is more stirred by human and personal happenings linked with their own experience in life than by abstract and distant problems.

admittedly insular in their outlook are not indifferent to what is going on around them. They have suffered so from the war just over that they are firmly resolved that no government shall lead them or their children into another such catastrophe. They also are angry at the government for permitting profiteering and the artificial inflation of prices while at the same time they have no patience with the soap-box orator who would rather live on government dimes and out of work, than work at a decent job.

May we refer to the words of Sir Philip Gibbs in speaking of his own people and their problems in a recent issue of his magazine, "The Review of Reviews." I believe that the instincts of the English people have not been divorced from their traditions and that the heart of England, in spite of disease and weakness and poison in some members of the body of our state is sound and strong and kind.

Joseph Conrad, the modern novelist, bears a similar testimony when

he declares: "Any given crowd may be stupid or even wicked. Yet I, who am no political democrat, have the deep seated conviction that in simple morality, self-control and courage the people in the mass are always better than the leaders."

To my mind there is another reason for the strength and stability of the English people, of which I have not yet spoken. They have honored their king, but also through their history they have feared God. Not that England has a great national sing, nor that her people have not given away to excesses at times, but speaking generally there has been a strong religious foundation to their national psychology that many a time has proved their salvation. All their great leaders, whether statesmen or literary men, have endeavored to govern their lives after their Lord. The beautiful staid village churches, some of them green with age, have had a tremendous influence in molding the hearts of the countryfolk.
