Railroading Legislation

THROUGH THE HOUSE—MORRIS
AND TORY PARTY FEAR BOND
WILL RETURN.

If not unprecedented, it certainly is most unusual, for such a dignified and decorous body as the House of Assembly to sit for the transaction of business during Holy Week, and many are the questions as to the reason. This is not far to seek. It is evident to the most obtuse that despite the decided checks given the Government by the intrepid Oppositionists, Messrs. Kent and Clift, they are running a headlong pace and trying to railroad legislation through the Assembly. Why? They see the havoc wrought by the above-named gentlemen and they dread such a reinforcement as Sir Robert Bond, who will, if possible, be in the Assembly before the end of the month. The Tory party has a wholesome dread of the "incorruptible commoner," and certainly their respect for Mr. Kent and Mr. Clift has increased. Now the public is watching the Premier's little game, and we believe that small as they are numerically the Opposition forces can stop it. Matters of expenditure in which extravagance and irregularity of the worst type have been discovered are before the House, and the public expect that deliberation and thought be given to such. If Sir Edward wants to get early on the stump and try at the same time to escape Sir Robert, it will be the duty of the Opposition to let him see that they will not brook such conduct.
