The Hopes of the People's Party Burnt to a Frazzle.

Special to The Evening Telegram. CATALINA, To-day. Little Catalina is sold for the coalition. Bond and Coaker. Lloyd, Stone and Target had great reception by guns, bunting and hearty greetings of the people. When Bond won in 1904 Little Catalina was nothing like as favourable as to-day. Morris will not get seven votes here. The change against the Government and in favor of the Coalition is extraordinary in magnitude. Last night the candidates and Coaker visited Elliston. They got a great reception. The whole population turned out with band and gave them a demonstration and torchlight procession throughout the harbor. Intense enthusiasm prevailed. Women in the gardens, on the streets and at the doors were even more enthusiastic than the men. The hall was packed so that there was not even standing room. A mighty change has come to this town, and the people universally endorse the coalition with Bond as leader. Coaker, Lloyd and Stone were warmly applauded and the people are moved with fervor. The candidates never saw his like before. If the Peoples Party can get fifty votes in Catalina, Little Catalina and Elliston and the neighboring settlements, they will have their work cut out.
