Three Fires Yesterday.

With a strong westerly wind rag-

ing at full blast, three fires occurred yesterday afternoon, two on the higher levels and one in the suburbs, and while they lasted caused muchanxiety. A curious coincidence is that two of yesterday's blazes were in the mmediate vicinity of where the big fire of '92 started. At 3.45 a telephone message was received at the Central Fire Station from Baird's cottage on the Freshwater Road intinating that a house in that neighborgood was on fire. With all possible despatch Supt. Dunn and two assistants set out to go countrywards with the steam engine, which was the most necessary apparatus to do fire fighting effectively in the country section. They had gone about three miles in the direction of Freshwater when they observed the school louse a mass of flames. One end of the school house was occupied by a family named Coish, who used to look after it. The school house and contents were razed to the ground and . the Coish family lost all their belongings, not having a cent of insurance carried. The origin of the fire was caused by sparks from a forest fire raging nearby and which was well under way. Other adjoining property was endangered but the splendid efforts of the firemen who worked the steam engine from a stream of water few yards distant extinguished the blaze before any further damage was done. The forest fire is supposed to have originated on account of trouters who were in Freshwater way on Thursday, the holiday, and it should be a warning in future not to be too careless with fires in the woods. At 4.30 an alarm was pulled in from box 252, at the corner of Pennywell and LeMarchant Roads, bringing the Central, Western and Eastern companies to Rocky Lane where the ouble houses occupied by the families of Messrs. Thomas Davis ond Wm. Aitken were ablaze. The wind was blowing with great violence at the ime making food for the flames and surrounding property was threatened. When the firemen arrived the fire had reached serious dimensions, and they put three streams of water on the buildings and ere long had the blaze under control, but not before both houses were gutted and all the furniture in them went up in smoke. except that saved by volunteers who worked well under Capt.
