At the City Hall.

Mayor Gosling presided at the special meeting of the City Council last night when matters in connection with the building of roads were discussed.

The Road Inspectors, who attended the meeting reported on the oil-sprinkling system, it being found that one gallon of oil covers about eight square yards of road. They were instructed to check up the carters that are receiving \$4.00 a day, and daily reports are to be made on all works of which they are in charge.

It was decided to repair the section of Water Street West from Job Street, but before doing so Inspector Rooney will report on the number of houses not connected with the sewer, as the Council intends to connect all houses that are fit with the main pipes.

The Engineer reported on the conditions of Summers' Street, McNeil Street and Willow Street. It will cost \$1,500 to lay sidewalks and gutters in these streets. The Secretary informed the meeting that the total tax from this locality did not exceed \$10 per year.

Councillor Brownrigg thought it unwise to spend such an amount when other more deserving citizens were being neglected.

Councillors Tait and Mullaly were of a different opinion than Mr. Brownrigg, and in the interest of public health thought something should be done in the matter. It was decided that \$270 be spent in the laying of sidewalks and gutters.

Councillor Ayre made reference to the iron fence surrounding the Parade Grounds which is badly in want of a coat of paint. Tenders will be asked.

The Secretary reported an interview with Mr. Clapp in connection with his contribution towards the tarvia pavement along Duckworth Street to Prescott Street. Mr. Clapp is willing to pay his share of the frontage of the Law Chambers but not for the vacant property east of the building. Other parties will contribute \$1.25 per lineal yard.

Councillor Tait suggested that in the event of Mr. Clapp's refusal, he be made to put up a good fence along the vacant property on Duckworth and Water Streets.

Councillor Vincombe was of the same opinion and made a further suggestion that all vacant property be fenced. He also referred to rock crusher installed east of the Custom House, which is a great annoyance to shop owners and residents. The matter will be inquired into.

Holyrood Maintains One Bed for One Year.

Some time ago, Mr. R. Dwyer, J.P., received a message from Chief Justice Horwood, requesting him to form a committee to guarantee the upkeep of one bed for sick or wounded soldiers for one year. The advice and suggestion of Rev. W. P. Finn, P.P., were sought, and he convened a public meeting for the following Sunday evening to discuss and decide the best means of providing the necessary funds for the maintenance of the bed. The meeting was held yesterday evening at 7 o'clock. Fr. Finn, in a few preliminary remarks, explained his reason for convening the meeting, appealed to them to give practical proof of their sympathy with the sick and wounded soldiers by undertaking the upkeep of a bed for one year, and moved Mr. W. P. Walsh to the chair. Mr. Walsh, whose son, Corporal Frank Walsh, did service at Gallipoli, but was recently wounded in the recent drive of the Allies, also forcibly appealed to the meeting and endorsed the patriotic sentiments of their esteemed friend and pastor the Rev. Fr. Finn. Mr. R. Dwyer was appointed Secretary and Mr. Wm. Vetch, Treas. The committee appointed by the meeting were Messrs. W. P. Walsh, Chairman; R. Dwyer, J.P. Secy.; William Vetch, Treas.; Edward Kirby, M. C. Dunphy, John Byrne, J. J. Hicks and Patrick Quinlan.

The Secretary read the Chief Justice's message to the meeting and moved that the committee formed from this meeting guarantee the necessary funds for the upkeep of a bed for one year. The motion was carried unanimously. Mr. William Coady, speaking to it promised to guarantee \$5.00 per month for the continuance of the war. Mr. P. J. Vetch guaranteed one dollar per month for one year, and Rev. W. P. Finn, E. Kirby, J. Carroll, William Vetch and D. Whelan promised to do their bit when the collectors got around. The collectors will canvass for subscriptions this week and report to a meeting to be held next Sunday, when the first monthly subscription will be forwarded.

Votes of sympathy were passed to W. P. Walsh and family, and Dr. Hogan and family for the trouble that has befallen them through the wounding of their sons in the recent drive of the Allies through France.

Germany's Gloom.

(By Leonard Spray.)

Rotterdam, July 18.—To say there is a panic in Germany would be an exaggeration, but it is well within the truth to describe the present feeling as one of the deepest gloom.

I am assured that a few days ago there was hardly a man in Berlin who believed that a serious military effort was to be made by Britain. The present attitude of the German people is as if a new enemy had entered the field against them. Their most trusted commentators talked for months about Britain's paper army.

Events have now shown the German public that the paper army has materialized into a great host of trained soldiers, who are driving their own best troops from positions they believed impregnable. The result is that there is manifestation of public dismay that is giving the Government the greatest concern.

In Berlin they are talking for the first time of the possibility of their iron wall in the West being broken. The vast majority of the German people long ago gave up any hope of conquest and any desire for anything further than a speedy peace.

They believed in the termination of the war, on the ground that the Allies would exert their maximum strength in an attempt to break their lines,

that the attempt would fail and that they then would be prepared to negotiate a compromise peace. The possibility of the Allies' efforts succeeding had never been contemplated until last week when the British captured the second line positions.
