EMILY ANDERSON ABANDONED.

HALIFAX, To-Day. A tale of hunger and suffering in Portugal was brought here yesterday by Capt. Leonard Miller of the tern schooner Emily M. Anderson, sunk in mid-ocean. The captain and his crew were brought in by an auxiliary cruiser. These were taken from the doom ed schooner in 27 W., 48 N., while they were on their return trip to St. John's, Nfid., from Oporto. With the schooner's crew was a young Portuguese stowaway, who was impelled to leave his home because of the lack of employment, money and food in his native city. The captain of the Anderson was in Oporto for 36 days and had made frequent visits to that port, but on his last visit found conditions most pitiable and the city overrun with starving beggars. The Emily Anderson started on her homeward trip on Jan. 11th. Through the Bay of Biscay terrific weather was encountered. On Jan. 25th the canvas was stripped from the schooner and her headgear was carried away. For six days and nights the crew pumped desperately to keep the craft afloat and the captain used every endeavor to keep in track of ocean steamships. On February 1st they were sighted by the auxiliary cruiser. A gale was blowing and, the schooner was being swamped with the heavy seas. No ordinary ship could have rescued the men, but the cruiser had a large derrick which lowered the boats clear of the ship's side and as she lay up to the windward of the Emily Anderson, she provided a lee which enabled Capt. Miller and the crew to be taken from their vessel. Those taken from the schooner were Capt. Miller, St. John's; his brother, Frank. Miller, mate, Boatswain Wm. Edwards, Hr. Grace; Cook, Walter Richards, Lahave; Seamen Thos McKinnon, Fogo; Ed Cox, St. John's, and the Portu guese stowaway. The Emily Anderson was owned by W. H. Hynes of St. John's East.

The first meagre details Wednesday night indicated that the death list due to the sinking of the ship might be approximately 1,000. A later estimate that night, however gave the number as 267 Thursday morning figures reduced this to 210, and this afternoon to 101, through information obtained by the orrespondent of the Associated Press in Ireland and confirmed by the American Embassy in London, the resned therefore number 2,297. Among the American survivors are 76 officers. The Tuscania, a liner of 14,348 gross tons was one of a strongly guarded convoy and was proceeding astward off the north coast of Ireand when the disaster overtook her. The shore line was visible from the tarboard side through the dusk of he coming night and it was from this direction that the lurking submarine discharged a torpedo that found its mark in the boiler room of the steamer. A second torpedo was seen to pass harmlessly astern. Apparently retribution at once befell the U-boat. destroyed dashed toward the evident location of the attacker and dropped depth bombs that resulted in the expressive phrase of submarine hunters an enemy being "done in". The explosion of the torpedo had immediately caused a tremendous list on the boats and rafts extremely hazardous in a heavy sea and darkness. Almost all loss of life and sustaining of injuries occurred because of this condition. Afloat for fully two hours, many patrol boats assisted the destroyers in the work of rescue and the survivors were landed at various Irish and Scotch ports, where prompt medical attention was given the wounded and the others were made comfortbale. 
