

### To-Day's Cables.

#### EMILY ANDERSON ABANDONED.

HALIFAX, To-day. A tale of hunger and suffering in Portugal was brought here yesterday by Capt. Leonard Miller of the tern schooner Emily M. Anderson, sunk in mid-ocean. The captain and his crew were brought in by an auxiliary cruiser. These were taken from the doomed schooner in 27 W., 48 N., while they were on their return trip to St. John's, Nfld., from Oporto. With the schooner's crew was a young Portuguese stowaway, who was impelled to leave his home because of the lack of employment, money and food in his native city. The captain of the Anderson was in Oporto for 36 days and had made frequent visits to that port, but on his last visit found conditions most pitiable and the city overrun with starving beggars. The Emily Anderson started on her homeward trip on Jan. 11th. Through the Bay of Biscay terrific weather was encountered. On Jan. 25th the canvas was stripped from the schooner and her headgear was carried away. For six days and nights the crew pumped desperately to keep the craft afloat and the captain used every endeavor to keep in track of ocean steamships. On February 1st they were sighted by the auxiliary cruiser. A gale was blowing and the schooner was being swamped with the heavy seas. No ordinary ship could have rescued the men, but the cruiser had a large derrick which lowered the boats clear of the ship's side and as she lay up to the windward of the Emily Anderson, she provided a lee which enabled Capt. Miller and the crew to be taken from their vessel. Those taken from the schooner were Capt. Miller, St. John's; his brother, Frank, Miller, mate, Boatswain Wm. Edwards, Hr. Grace, Cook, Walter Richards, Lahave; Seaman Thos. McKinnon, Forp; Ed Cox, St. John's, and the Portuguese stowaway. The Emily Anderson was owned by W. H. Hynes of St. John's East.

#### TRAINS MOVING.

NEW YORK, To-day. The railways east of Chicago were to-day recovering slowly from the recent storm and low temperatures and were opening up the lines which were snowed in. According to reports received from the office of the Regional Director, A. H. Smith, in Pittsburgh District, conditions were improving with moderating weather. In northern New York some freight trains were being operated again, but the movement into New England was still below normal, moderating weather

#### ONLY FOREIGNERS LOST.

WASHINGTON, To-day. All members of naval armed guard and all Americans of the crew saved when the American steamer Allamanc was torpedoed and sunk in the war zone last Thursday, the State Department dispatch to-day said, six foreigners were lost.

#### U. S. INSURE SOLDIERS.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Every American soldier lost on the Tuscania having dependents was protected by Government Insurance. Many had applied for voluntary insurance, which is issued in amounts up to \$10,000, and all those covered by Government compensation will be payable to widow, child or widowed mother. This automatic insurance aggregates \$4,800 and is paid about \$25 a month for 20 years.

#### SAVED BY BOAT.

BELFAST, Ireland, To-day. One steward on the Tuscania named Houston, whose home is in New York, was near the engine room when the explosion occurred. He had some difficulty in reaching his boat station owing to the list to the starboard, but eventually the steward found the boat

#### ENEMY ATTACK REPULSED.

PARIS, To-day. The War Office statement to-night says: We repulsed at daylight an enemy attempt against one of our small posts in the region north of Craonne, after a bombardment reported this morning on the right bank of the Meuse and in Alsace, Germans carried out east of Smognex as well as to north corner of Bois des Fosse and on our lines south of Hartmannswillerkopf, three attacks which we repulsed inflicting heavy losses on the enemy and capturing material.

#### ARTILLERY DUELS.

BERLIN, To-day. (British Admiralty Wireless Press). Official statement from general headquarters to-day says: West theatre in the afternoon, there was artillery duel near coast and infantry detachments brought prisoners as result. An attack east of Zandvoorde and four field engagements in Artois, British artillery was active on both sides of the Scarpe and west of Cambrai. French attack in Champagne broke down in Meuse region but there was artillery activity throughout the day supporting successful reconnaissance south west Annes. Elsewhere there was nothing important.

#### FIELD RAIDS.

PARIS, To-day. Reports of active cannonades on the Alsne and Verdun front and in Alsace, where in half a dozen forays the Germans were repulsed and in which the enemy lost men and material, are to hand. According to Berlin, the Germans captured prisoners in a raid in Flanders and forestalled engagement in Artois, and that a French attack in Champagne broke down.

#### BOMBARDMENT RENEWED.

ROME To-day. There are reports of slight artillery activity on all the Italian fronts, and that hostile aircraft Wednesday morning renewed their bombardments of Italian towns. The number of enemy machines brought down by Entente airmen on the Italian front from Jan. 26th to Feb. 6th, was 66.

#### THE SPORTIVE RUSSIAN.

PETROGRAD, To-day. Advice reaching London, say looting occurred Tuesday and Wednesday in the Russian capital, when wine cellars were sacked by a mob. The authorities used armored cars to oppose the pillagers, many of whom were killed or wounded.

#### INFANCY AND OLD AGE.

AMSTERDAM, To-day. The Telegraf has received advice from the frontier that an order has been issued by the Germans summoning the male population of the Flemish coast for military labor; the age limits of the conscripted persons are from thirteen to sixty years.

#### UNITED STATES DETERMINED.

BALTIMORE, To-day. Submarines or no submarines, the United States will continue fearlessly to send troops to France, declared

Secretary of the Navy, Daniels, in referring to the torpedoing of the Tuscania, in an address before the Baltimore Press Club. "Just as fast as our ships can carry men to Europe they will go," continued Mr. Daniels, "and just as fast as they are equipped they will be sent, and the ships will carry them and no man living will ever again see the day when our goods will be carried across the Atlantic, except in ships flying the flag of the United States."

troopship Tuscania off the Irish Coast at dusk Tuesday evening, according to latest reports. She carried 2,397 souls, including 2,173 United States Army Foresters, engineers, supply, trainmen, military police and aeronauts. The first meagre details Wednesday night indicated that the death list due to the sinking of the ship might be approximately 1,000. A later estimate that night, however, gave the number as 267 missing. Thursday morning figures reduced this to 210, and this afternoon to 101, through information obtained by the correspondent of the Associated Press in Ireland and confirmed by the American Embassy in London, the rescued therefore number 2,297. Among the American survivors are 76 officers. The Tuscania, a liner of 14,248 gross tons was one of a strongly guarded convoy and was proceeding eastward off the north coast of Ireland when the disaster overtook her. The shore line was visible from the starboard side through the dusk of the coming night and it was from this direction that the lurking submarine discharged a torpedo that found its mark in the boiler room of the steamer. A second torpedo was seen to pass harmlessly astern. Apparently retribution at once befell the U-boat. According to the testimony of an American officer, who was one of the last to leave the Tuscania, a British destroyer dashed toward the evident location of the attacker and dropped depth bombs that resulted in the explosive phrase of submarine hunters, an enemy being "gone for." The explosion of the torpedo had immediately caused a tremendous list on the Tuscania and made launching of boats and rafts extremely hazardous in a heavy sea and darkness. Almost all loss of life and sustaining of injuries occurred because of this condition. Afloat for fully two hours, many patrol boats assisted the destroyers in the work of rescue and the survivors were landed at various Irish and Scotch ports, where prompt medical attention was given the wounded and the others were made comfortable. Operations on the west front continue to be marked by heavy artillery exchanges in conjunction with raiding attacks on opposing trenches.

#### ENGLAND STIRRED.

LONDON, To-day. Few events of the war in the past few months have stirred the English people more deeply than the disaster to American troops approaching a British harbor on a British transport. Such an eventuality had been feared.

#### MORE AIR FIGHTS.

LONDON, To-day. Official announcement dealing with aerial operations follows: More than a ton of bombs were dropped Wednesday on various targets behind the enemy's lines. Two hostile machines were downed in the air fighting. Two of our machines are missing.

#### DOUBTS THE BOLSHIEVIKI.

AMSTERDAM, To-day. Advice from Budapest says that Count Julius Andrássy, former Hungarian Premier declared in the Lower House that he was convinced the Russian Bolshieviki were not serious in their peace intentions. Count Andrássy said: "The Bolshieviki are hoping to succeed through their agitation in organizing anarchy in our midst that shall terrorize the Government." We understand now why the demand that Poland shall decide its own destiny, when our troops have been withdrawn. In that case Poland would be unable to decide its fate free of terrorization, because the Bolshieviki would interfere in its affairs just as now they are interfering in the affairs of the Ukraine and Finland.

FOGOTA ARRIVES.—The s.s. Fogota reached port at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the northern coastal service having got as far as Nipper's Hr.
