A GOOD STYLE FOR A SLENDER FIGURE.

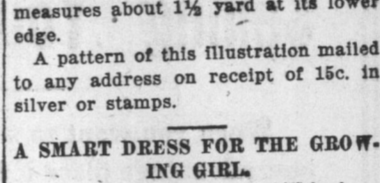
