Peat Possibilities

In Great Britain and Ireland there are over eight million acres of peat, of an average depth of 12ft. to 14ft. It is claimed that this peat represents vast untapped wealth.

By machinery actually in existence and which only needs applying, peat could be briquetted within eight hours and the briquettes, being very hard could be transported anywhere without breaking or disintegrating.

We might also get all the carbon we equire from these vast peat fields. It has the advantage of coal because it is not mined but dug from the surface, and when the twelve or fourteen feet peat is removed the earth beneath t'is ready for cultivation-a process hat the presence of the peat prevents. The exploitation of peat would, men and introduce a cheap, practically smokeless, and very hot fuel. For the production of electrical power peat is an ideal fuel, whilst its high yield of oil could be used for motor purposes
