ONTARIO DAIRYMEN'S ASSOCIATION.—A convention, under the auspices of this Association, will be held in the Masonie Hall, Belleville, on the 13th and 14th of March, when several matters of interest connected with the dairy business in general will be discussed. Several able and scientific men have been secured to deliver addresses on the occasion. Several topics of interest to dairymen will also be discussed.

THE WATEREOO R. R. EXTENSION.—The Galt Reformer learns that the Grand Trunk surveyors will commence the survey of the Branch line of Road which is to be built from Berliu to Waterloo. The length of the extension will be about two miles, and the work of surveying will not occupy much time, so that tenders for the work will doubtless be asked for early in the spring.

Source in Berlin.—A very successful soirce and conversazione, which was largely attended by the people of all denominations, was held in Berlin on Thesday evening by the ladies of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, in connection with the induction of the Rev. J. F. Dickie into the pastorate of that congregation. The entertainment consisted of music, and addresses by the Revs. Clarke and Wardrope, of Guelph, and several other gentlemen. The Rev. Mr. Dickie gave an address in the course of the evening, and received a very warm welcome.

A DISPUTE ABOUT WEIGHT.—Mr. Samuel Ellison, of Wallace, had a letter in last week's Listowel Banner, which he I ask us to copy. We can give the gist of it in a few words, premising that Mr. Ellison in not giving the name of the buyer omitted the most important part of his letter, Mr. E. says he sold 25 bags of barley to a buyer not many miles east of Palmerston. He weighed them before he left home. When weighed by the buyer the grain was short of Mr. Ellison's weight 255. He insisted on the grain being weighed again, when the buyer came up 115 lbs., which still left him deficient pay. Mr. Ellison's the buyer refused. Mr. Ellison's this weight cook is next load, which he had himself weighed in his own barn, to Drayton, where the weight tallied with what he had made it. Such is Mr. Ellison's report as given in his letter.

TOWN COUNTIL.

A special meeting of the Town Council. was held on Tuesday night. His Worship the Mayor in the chair. Present—Messrs, Kennedy, Snider, Crowe, Bell, Stevenson, Bruce, Stewart, Allan, McMillan, Mitchell, Robertson.

The Mayor read the report of the Tavern Inspector, Mr. Ainley, as follows:—In accordance with instruction from His Worship the Mayor, I beg to submit the following report in addition to that already furnished. By statute I am requested to report that the applicants are fit and proper persons. I may be permitted to state that although a certain number were charged with violating the Statute and By-law, nevertheless I have no reason to report against any of the present licensed hotels or saloon-keepers. I herewith submit the names of those charged with violating the statute above referred to during the past year:—Thos. Ellis, fined \$20; Jas. Parker, do. \$20; Fenry Newton, do. \$20; Dan. Heffernan, do. \$20; Fuhry & Coghlin, do. \$20.

On motion the Council went into Committee on the report, Mr. Howard in the chair. Some objection was made by several of the members to receiving the report, as it did not give all the necessary information and did not state whether the parties were fit and proper persons to hold licenses.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES THANKSGIVING SERVICE.

London, Feb. 27—10 a. m.—The day of thanksg uing for the recovery of the Prince of Wales opened with salutes and ringing of bells at sunrise. From an early hour the streets through which the procession was to pass were eleared of vehicles and pedestrians. The line of march to and from the Cathedral is seven miles. The carriage-way along the entire route is fenced in, and uninterrupted from curb to curb. The houses on both sides are decorated from cellar to atticnot house by house, but block by block—and all open spaces are filled with banks of seats; avenues of flags-streamers and gorgeous tapestry wind for miles through the heart of the city, passing under costly triumphal arches, and every available place is occupied by spectators, who are only to be numbered by millions. Fabulous prices are given for single seats, and houses let for the day at their rent for a year. Twelve thousand soldiers, and almost the entire police force guarded the lines. The decorators had hardly finished their work when the general public holding tickets were admitted to St Paul's The transformation which had been made in the interior of the cathedral caused universal surpise and admiration. The decorations were superb, and the arrangement of the throne, gallerius, and seats for the public such as to afford a favorable view to all, and at the same time display the great mass of the people to the best advantage. It is estimated that 14,000 persons were seated within the Cathedral, while thousands upon thousands outside are within hearing of the music.

Prace Society Meeting.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 27.— Joseph Brown and Isaac Hammel, both young men, were arrested to-day on suspicion of the murder of Daniel Kramer and fatal injury to his wife, and were both broughthere this morning. Brown made a partial confession, and acknowledged to having accompanied Hammel to the door of Kramer's honse, but alleges that Hammel committed the murder.

Baltimore, Feb. 27.—A meeting was held to-night under the auspices of the American Peace Society to discuss the Washington Treaty. Reverdy Johnson presided, and addressed the audience in an exhaustive speech of nearly two hours duration on the relation of the two countries, particularly with reference to cur case before the Geneva Commission and the question of consequential or indirect damages. Johnson gave an interesting historic statement of the negotiations which preceded the previous treaties, and also those attending the late Treaty of Washington.
