There is little doubt but that the voluntary method of raising money has not been entirely successful and that contributors in this province at least are convinced that the fund

should be raised out of taxation. But the rather cool way that it is EDICINE HAT REPRESENTATIVE handed over to the provinces and the municipalities is interesting. The patriotic fund is a national affair and should be organized, raised and administered by the Dominion.

If it is placed upon a provincia basis, then the provinces would not only have to raise the fund but administer it as well, which would not be good business or efficient organization.
