The marriage took place in St. Thomas on Friday of Mr. Joseph Welsh, of Dutton, and Miss Doris Brown, of Stockport, England, who arrived at Quebec last week. Mr. Welsh met his bride while on service overseas.

Dr. Lorne Graham, who enlisted in the Imperial service at the beginning of the war and has been overseas since, arrived in Dutton last week and will remain for some time with relatives in Dutton and Dunwich.

The official returns made by D. E. Gerrard, returning officer, for West Elgin, give E. G. Cameron, the victorious United Farmer-Independent Labor candidate, a majority of 1,879 over the Hon. F. G. Macdormid.

A fine sample of ripe strawberries, picked the last of October in the garden of Peter McNeil, is on exhibition in the window at the agricultural office. The fruit is of extraordinary size and almost equal in taste to that of the first crop.

The quarterly meeting of the Covenanted Baptists was held in Dutton on Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Large congregations attended, many being present from Lobo, Exford and Dunwich. Elder Blanson, the presiding elder, was assisted by Elder Beaton, of New York.

The death occurred at his home in Dresden on Friday of Mr. Fred. Law, after a week's illness with pneumonia. He was 47 years of age and represented the Gray-Dort, previously being engaged in farming. His wife survives him and also three daughters. The deceased was a nephew of Mr. James Law, of Dutton.

Mr. and Mrs. James Teetzel, who recently left for their home in Vancouver, spent a week with their son, Edward Teetzel, at Monitor, Alta., where they experienced a regular blizzard, according to a letter received by friends in Dutton from them. A foot of snow had fallen and so severe was the weather that all business was suspended.

The bulbs which were ordered by the Horticultural Society in Holland have been held up in New York for three weeks owing to the longshoremen's strike. W. H. Cape has received word from the Canadian agent representing the Holland firm that the shipment will be shortly released and the bulbs for Dutton will arrive in a few days.

The Ministerial Association of Dutton and Dunwich held a meeting on Monday in the Presbyterian church for the election of officers, when all members were present. Rev. C. H. P. Owen was elected president; Rev. J. McKillop, vice-president; and Rev. J. H. Colclough, secretary-treasurer. Revs. R. Stewart, J. A. Suell and J. H. Colclough were named as a committee to arrange the program for the coming year.

WAS TEACHER AT IONA

Joseph Graham, Formerly of Dunwich, Dies in Oregon

The death occurred at his home in Portland, Ore., on the October 20th, of Mr. Joseph Graham, son of the late Malcolm and Margaret Graham, of Dunwich, in his sixtieth year. He leaves a wife, three sons and two daughters, also two brothers, James Graham, of Salem, Ore., and Malcolm Graham, of Iona, to mourn his loss. The late Mr. Graham was born in Dunwich and received his early education at the Iona public school, and the St. Thomas High School. In his young days he received a teacher's certificate and taught very successfully at Iona for a number of years. He afterwards went to Hazel, S.D., where he engaged in farming, and teaching in the winter season, and was appointed school inspector, which office he capably filled for several years. Then failing health compelled him and his family to resort to a warmer climate. They settled in Salem, Ore., where he engaged in the real estate business, later moving to Portland, Ore. The late Mr. Graham possessed a genial and cheerful disposition and his many relatives and friends in West Elgin will regret to hear of his death.

FORMER MIDDLESEX WARDEN DEAD

The death of George B. Campbell occurred in the general hospital at Westsaskwin, Alberta, on Friday afternoon, October 21. Deceased had been sitting for some months, never having recovered from the "flu" last winter. About two weeks ago he was stricken with pneumonia, and with the weakened condition of the heart failed to recover.

The funeral was held from his late residence in Westsaskwin. His brother, Angus, was with him when he died. He was the third son of the late Angus Campbell, J.P. of Appin. Besides his widow and two young daughters, he leaves to mourn five brothers and one sister: J. Ferguson Campbell, of Yeargow, Montana; Dr. T. F. Campbell, of Wickenburg, Arizona; Angus, of Grand Prairie, Alta.; Samuel E., of Dutton, and J. Hagry, of Toronto, and Mrs. J. S. MacRae, of Appin.

George B. Campbell was an ex-warden of the County of Middlesex. He also ran against Sir Geo. W. Ross over twenty years ago.

The late G. B. Campbell was also a member of the firm of contractors of Hamilton, Dart & Campbell, who built the P.M. Railway from Ridgeway to St. Thomas some eighteen years ago. The late Mr. Campbell was in his 54th year and a Presbyterian in religion and a prominent Orangeman.

DUTTON COUNCIL

The council of the village of Dutton met on Monday evening, with all the members present.

W. H. Cape addressed the council in reference to the work done by the cultural Society in beautifying the park and the village and the cost of the same.

S. C. Kirkland, on behalf of the returned men, who are owners of property, drew the attention of the council to the amendment to the assessment act whereby a council may pass a by-law exempting from taxation, except for local improvements and school purposes, for ten years dwelling houses owned and occupied by returned men, and such a by-law be passed in Dutton. No action was taken until the steps taken by other municipalities are ascertained.

J. Dent asked that some steps be taken to improve the street south of the railway, and the reserve was authorized to procure two cars of gravel for that purpose.

J. M. Blue was authorized to invest \$1,000 of the surplus of the Hydro system in Victory Bonds.

FARMS SOLD

Geo. Milligan has purchased the old Lawrence farm at Payne's Mills, containing 100 acres, for \$10,000.

Large real estate transactions have taken place in the southern part of the township in the past few days. Geo. H. Lidster has purchased the farm of R. P. Green, consisting of 200 acres, and Mr. Green the farm of Alfred Bobier, containing 200 acres. The prices paid to be paid were \$16,000 and \$14,000, respectively.

John Brown has disposed of his 50-acre farm to Harold Green for \$5,200. On this farm the Port Talbot postoffice was located for many years, until it was closed with the introduction of rural delivery.

A case of smallpox has been reported in the north part of the township. James Stevenson, of Tyndora, left last week with a hunting party going to New Ontario.

Hallowe'en was more quietly observed this year than on former occasions, very little damage being reported. Dunwich and Dutton have subscribed \$73.40 to the new Victory Loan, being a little over a third of their objective of \$200,000.

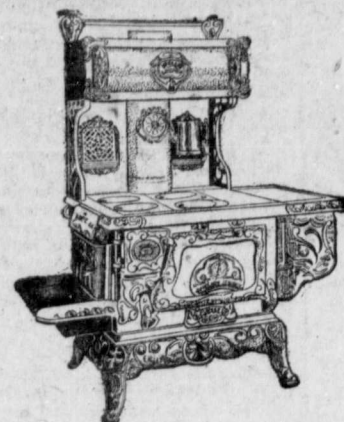
