

WESTERN ONTARIO.

BRANT.
An examination took place at Brantford the other day in a breach of promise suit. The plaintiff is a good-looking young Brantford township girl and the defendant a son of Mr. Hunter, the well-known sheep raiser. Damages are placed at \$2,000. The case will come up at next sittings.

ELGIN.
Some four or five years ago a tin cash box full of deeds and stamps was stolen from the office of Farley & McDonald, barristers, at St. Thomas. The box was fished out of Kettle Creek the other day by some boys who were fishing.

Mrs. Lavina Drake, relict of the late Wm. Drake, died at Port Burwell on Friday, aged 73. She left two sons and four daughters.

Mrs. Charlotte Crossett, Bayham, died a few days ago at the residence of her son, C. S. Crossett, J. C. near the Bayham cheese factory. The deceased was the widow of Peter Crossett, who died some years ago. She and her husband settled on their farm in North Bayham when that part of the country was almost an unbroken forest. Being no doubt the best farm in Bayham, passed now to the youngest son, Charles, who lives on the adjoining farm.

ESSEX.
Warden Davis, of the Jackson (Mich.) State prison, is in Windsor making arrangements looking to the extradition of James Butler, the convict who escaped from that institution. Butler still maintains that he will fight the proceedings, and talks extradition law like a barrister.

David Grant was arrested at Windsor Tuesday, charged with stealing \$17 from his sister, Mrs. Davidson. He was drunk when arrested, and showed what money he had left in his mouth. He was made to disgorge, and his relatives did not wish to push the charge of stealing, he was sent down for fourteen days for being drunk.

GREY.
These bills have been read the third time in the Legislature. To consolidate the debt of the town of Owen Sound; to consolidate the debt of the town of Chatham; respecting the Dundas and Waterloo macadamized road.

RENT.
A young woman about 25 years of age was found the other day wandering about the commons near Ridgeway in a demented condition. Chief Tompkins was notified, and he took the young woman in charge. It was found that her name was Hill, daughter of a farmer of that name residing near Bothwell. He was notified of his daughter's whereabouts, and took her home.

At Osgoode Hall on Tuesday, in the case Langstaff vs. McRae, Wm. Langstaff, judgment was given on motion by the defendant to set aside the verdict and judgment for the plaintiff in an action tried before Macdonald, J., and a jury at Saratoga at the Autumn Assizes, 1891, for \$1,000 damages for injury to the plaintiff's growing crops by reason of an overflow caused by the defendants throwing a boom across the River Sydenham, on the banks of which the plaintiff's lands lay, and so causing a great quantity of logs and drift-wood to accumulate and form a dam. The Divisional Court held that as the act of the defendants in throwing a boom across the river was in itself lawful, being, in fact, expressly authorized by statute, and as the damage suffered was approximately caused by an unusual fall of rain and by circumstances beyond the defendants' control, the latter should not be held liable. Order accordingly, setting aside the verdict and judgment for the plaintiff and directing judgment for the defendants with costs.

MIDDLESEX.
The North Dorchester Council met on Monday. Orders were given for \$202.50 on account of gravel on township roads, and several minor accounts were also paid. The amount of money for the several gravel roads for this year will be as follows: provided Niagara and Westminster Councils apportion the same amount on their townships: Elgin road north, \$100; Elgin road south, \$300; Governor's road, \$250; west township, \$250; Hamilton road, \$250; and Avon road, \$200. James McCullum, a member of this council, was granted leave of absence for two months. The Council adjourned to meet on the last Monday of April.

OXFORD.
A. C. Misener, stock dealer, will build a 12x35 feet hog pen at Princeton. George Green and Morris Kennedy, of Woodstock, went to Litchton on Friday last to seek employment. Green deserted his friend, taking \$25 and an overcoat. Green was arrested in Cleveland and taken to Buffalo. He is said to have done time lately for burglary in New York.

FEITH.
Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Listowel, has been elected by Erskine Church congregation, Ottawa. The Synod of Hamilton and Ottawa meets in Stratford on April 19, when this call will be considered. Mr. Campbell went to Listowel some eight or nine years ago as the successor to Rev. J. W. Bell, M.A., and under his administration the membership of the church has increased, so much so that in the early years of his pastorate the capacity of the old church became inadequate to the needs of the growing congregation, when the scheme for the building of a new church was inaugurated which resulted in the building of the beautiful edifice that adorns the corner where the old church stood.

The Mitchell Blue Ribbon Association has a new membership of 917. The arbitration case of Walkom vs. the Honour Judge Woods on Monday. The claimant asks \$400 damages because the corporation raised the sidewalk in front of his shop on the Mitchell road. A number of witnesses were examined on behalf of the claimant, and the case was adjourned till Friday.

In November last the Reliance Electric Company, of Waterloo, contracted with the city council of Stratford to light that city with 20 electric lights at 20 cents per light per night, the lights to be 2,000 candle power. In the latter part of December the Reliance Company sold its contract to the Stratford Gas Company, and an electrical engineer has since decided the light furnished is not up to the standard agreed upon. The sale of the contract to the gas company has never been recognized by the council, and the Reliance Company disclaims responsibility. In the meantime the city is getting its light free, the council having refused to pay for the light on the ground that it is not equal to the agreement calls for. The trouble, it is expected, will terminate in a lawsuit.

Wood finds a ready sale in Listowel at \$4.50 per cord.

WELLINGTON.
A special meeting of the Board of Education has been held to hear the report of the School Management Committee on the resignation of Rev. Dr. Torrance as public school inspector and secretary of the Board. For 37 years steadily he has been inspector and for over 35 years secretary, and during that time has done a great deal for the advancement of education in Guelph. The reason of his resignation is that he is getting too great on his strength. The Board accepted his resignation with regret, and the committee recommended that Wm. Tyler, B.A., head master of the Collegiate Institute, be appointed in his place. Mr. Tyler's health has been not of the very best for some time past, and he feels that he cannot much longer do full justice to his position as head master. He also has done great service in connection with the educational work of his city.

WELLINGTON.
At the Guelph Assizes the case of McEwen vs. McKew was action by a father against his son to set aside an agreement by which the defendant was alleged to have gained an advantage over his father, while the latter was intoxicated, and for arrears of an annuity. It was settled out of court and proceedings pending the carrying out of the settlement by the son.

Kirkland vs. the Canadian Relief Society was an action brought by Mrs. M. J. Kirkland at the Guelph Assizes to recover \$1,000, the amount of a policy issued by the defendant society on the life of the late John S. Rogerson. Judgment was entered for the plaintiff by consent for \$600.

Sanford vs. Sanford at the Guelph Assizes was an action by a married woman against her husband, to recover a lot in Minto township. The wife claimed that in 1866 the husband made a deed of the farm to her, because, owing to the abuse she had received from him, they separated. He left for Hallowell, taking away considerable of the furniture to a farm he had there, but immediately returned assuming the control of the farm in Minto. She objected and notified him to leave her in quiet possession. He refused, and abused her until she had to leave, and she brought this action to recover possession. The verdict was for the defendant without costs, the chief justice holding that the plaintiff having been married between 1859 and 1872, and having received the lands during coverture from the husband, could not eject the husband.

ARCH-DEIEND MICHAEL.
The Hamlin Avenue Fanatic Getting Deeper in the Mire.
DETROIT, March 30.—The police are determined that Prince Michael will not have a loophole by which to escape from the punishment which his crimes so richly deserve. Not satisfied with the two strong complaints which have already been made against him, the authorities have obtained a third complaint on a charge preferred by 15-year-old Bernice Bickie. The child's father and mother, both of whom belong to the Holy Trinity Church, have made the grievous indignity to which their daughter had been subjected until they were shown her sworn statement of the arch-deiend's doings.

The prince and his alleged paramour, Eliza Courts, still occupy widely separated cells in the central station. Michael was asked whether he desired the services of an attorney to defend him. He replied that his father and mother in heaven would defend him.

Mrs. M. R. Mills, the complainant in the complaints first made, has secured possession of the keys of the God-house on Hamlin avenue and will probably occupy that habitation until the case is settled in the courts. She has sent for her brother, an instructor in the St. Thomas Collegiate Institute.

The latest revelations are the confessions of improper relations with the prince made by May Webster, Alice Curtis and Carrie Bonker. The greatest indignation prevails and lynching is talked of.

DEATH OF A DELUDED DISCIPLE.
RICHMOND, Ky., March 30.—L. E. Francis, an apostle of Schweinfurth, the Illinois false prophet, died in his hotel this morning, aged 64. He often declared he would never die. The deceased was formerly a leading citizen of Madison county, and for 40 years a member of the Christian Church, and was wealthy. He died almost in poverty, having given largely to the Illinois impostor.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 30.—The long sought for star behind the sun which Lieut. Totten predicted would appear yesterday when the last week of anti-Christ began did not so far as known put in an appearance. The lieutenant was on the streets, and did not appear fearful of the closing day of his calendar. He said this day of sinners, the day of the last of the new sacred Jewish year.
