When No. I Committee of the Board of Education was called to order by Chairman Stephenson last evening Trustees Johnston, Yates, Jeffers, Jeffery, Cryer, Rowlanda, Luscombe, Inspector Boyle and several teachers were present. After referring some accounts and Mr. Hunt's tender to the Board, it was decided in accordance with Mr. Cook's motion to report cases to the Board where pupils failed in one subject only, while securing the aggregate number of marks. Permission was granted to the Protestant Orphans' Home authorities tessend a few children to the public schools. The trouble between Mr. Learn, headmaster of King street school, and Inspector Boyle, was the next subject broached, Mr. Yates suggesting that some amicable settlement be arrived at.

Mr. Jeffery referred to a direct charge of lying which the Inspector had made against him. Mr. Boyle said he had only reported regarding six teachers while in reality the number was eleven.

Mr. Carson—You did. I understood Mr. Mr. Carson—You did. I understood Mr. Learn's note to mean that pupils could do fifth grade work and that instead of passing in Miss Mulvaney's room they should stand on the same level as hers and be examined for sixth grade work. I do not think Mr. Learn's note would lead to the impression that he was going to complain. Miss Winnett, Miss Mulvaney and Miss Yates were called and gave evidence as to receiving examination papers and an explanatory vote from Mr. Learn. Miss Winnett identified the questions which Mr. Boyle produced as those asked by Mr. Learn's note.

Mr. Learn denied having sent either letter or questions to Miss Mulvaney. There
