CRANE VERSUS CRANE.

Interesting Divorce Case-Married for Money and Didn't Get It.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Mrs. Walter Beverley Crane, formerly Miss Alice Cooper, of New York, but more recently of Paris, has brought an action in the Divorce Division York, but more recently of Paris, has brought an action in the Divorce Division of her Majesty's High Court of Justice for the annulment of her marriage, on the ground that it was brought about through force and duress. Sir Henry James, for the petitioner, told her story in court to-day. The couple are cousins. Mrs. Crane alleges that while she was in London in 1888, Crane, whose offer of marriage she had rejected, invited her to visit St. Paul's Cathedral with him. She accepted the invitation, but instead of driving to St. Paul's, Crane, who had secured a special license without her knowledge, took her to the Church of St. Bride's, on Fleet street. On the way thither Crane drew a revolver and threatened that unless she married him immediately he would shoot revoiver and threatened that unless she married him immediately he would shoot himself. Miss Cooper was in delicate health and Crane's action was so sudden and unexpected that she was dazed and, hardly knowing what she was doing, she entered St. Bride's and was so frightened that she made no protest and went through a marriage coremon with him through a marriage ceremony with him.
Upon the conclusion of the ceremony Mrs.
Crane returned at once to her mother.
Crane, apparently satisfied that he would obtain control of the money which he believed his wife presented. obtain control of the money which he be-lieved his wife possessed, returned to America shortly after his marriage. 
