LONDON AND PRECINCTS.

Mass meeting in the skating rink, South London, to-night.

The Misses Cowan, of this city, have been visiting Mrs. Maxwell, Strathroy.

Nomination day will be a week from today. Mr. Wm. Glass is the returning officer for this city, and the return for receiving nominations is 11 o'clock, in the City Hall.

There was a good market to-day, but sales were a little slow. Butter brought from 14 to 15 cents, eggs from 11 to 12 cents. There was a fine variety of flowers, most of which were in bloom.

An Ottawa telegram says: "Mr. Alex. Jacques, 'The Old Man,' is critically ill to-night. He is over 70 years of age." The "Old Man" is one of the best-known showmen on the continent, and had quite a large circle of acquaintances in this city.

Mr. Francis Plank, of Port Huron, formerly of the township of Westminister, died at that place last week. The remains were taken to Strathroy and buried, Rev. Charles Smith conducting the funeral service. A wife and three children survive the deceased.

The Fraser House, Port Stanley, is now open for the reception of guests and several are there already from Chicago and other points. Under the able management of Mr.

W. Fraser this popular and favorite summer resort is sure to keep up its prestige as a first-class summer hotel.

Mr. Holman has been employed by the McClary firm for 31 years.

Another sign of Vancouver's growth metropolisward is shown by the many handsome new equipments to be seen on her streets. Messrs. Queen Bros. have just added to their already fine stock a handsome hack, valued at \$1,000. The vehicle is certainly a credit to Vancouver, its shining exterior, its luxuriously upholstered inside, and its silver-plated and beautifully ornamented lamps making it actually the "most stylish rig" in town. J. Campbell, of London, Ont., was the maker. [Vancouver World.]

Rev. Dr. Castle has many friends in London who will hear with regret that the reverend gentleman is again seriously ill. "We learn," says the Canadian Baptist, "that Dr. Castle, after preaching for about fifteen consecutive Sundays, has again felt obliged to relinquish his work and to seek rest outside of his native city. He is suffering from a severe cold, and his health is so weak that he is unable to perform his duties. He will, however, be back in a few days, and will resume his work with renewed vigor. He has the profoundest sympathy of the readers of the Baptist, and their prayers for the successful issue of the operation."

Mr. John Odell, Medicine Hat immigration agent, returned yesterday from Western Ontario, where he spent six weeks in the catalogue. He says that a large number of them will visit this district during the coming summer. Many wealthy farmers and stock raisers are desirous of emigrating to the Northwest. Mr. Odell brought up a carload of settlers' effects, among which is a beautiful span of road mares. [Medicine Hat Times.]

Mr. S. W. Wilson's Funeral.

The funeral of the late Mr. S. W. Wilson, organist of Andrew's Church, took place yesterday morning from his late residence, Queen's avenue, to the C. P. R. depot, and thence to Toronto. An impressive service was conducted at the house by Rev. A. Murray. The pallbearers were all members of the choir—Messrs. J. W. McIntosh, Jas. Mason, Wm. Muir, F. Rossier, Robt. Brebner, and Robinson. The mother and brother of Mrs. Wilson, who arrived in the city yesterday, and Mr. James McQueen and Mr. C. R. Somerville (as a deputation from the congregation), accompanied the remains to Toronto. The deceased's brother preceded the cortege to Toronto yesterday to arrange for the funeral.

The Kansas Forger's Case.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday Judge Rose gave judgment on the motion for the discharge from custody of John Wesley Parker who is held here under the warrant of committal of the junior judge of the County Court of Middlesex, for extradition to the United States on a charge of forgery. The second objection to the warrant was that there was no evidence of the forgery, the original note not having been produced to the defendants whose depositions were produced and acted upon, before the county judge, Rose, J., it is of the opinion upon this objection that the evidence before the county judge was not competent evidence to show forgery and that the prisoner is entitled to his discharge, unless there is power to set aside the commitment and remand the prisoner back to custody that a further examination may be held upon the original warrant. If by Monday next the counsel for the prosecution does not obtain an appointment to hear argument on the question of remand, order to go for the discharge of the prisoner. The other objections are overruled. Aylesworth and McKillop (London) for the prosecutors.

Particulars of Mrs. McArthur's Death.

A Nain correspondent writes: Another old settler, Mrs. McArthur (mother of Dr. McArthur, of London), has departed suddenly from our midst. For the past two or three weeks the deceased had been suffering from a gripple, but was recovering, so much that she was attending to her ordinary duties. On Thursday night, however, she retired to bed as usual and slept quietly. Her daughter, who slept in the same room, called to her early in the morning and receiving no answer, looked at her in death, without any signs of a single struggle. Her husband, Mr. James McArthur, was older in the Presbyterian Church at Nain, and died two and a half years ago. In the death of this estimable lady the church loses one of its most faithful workers. From infancy she taught her family to attend Sunday school and church and yet, although they are young men and women, they still followed her into Sunday school, in the charge of which she had charge of the infant class for many years, a post for which she was eminently fitted. Among the sick she was a welcome visitor. In the Women's Foreign Missionary Society she held a distinguished place. In short, in every good word and work she was a "mother in Israel."
