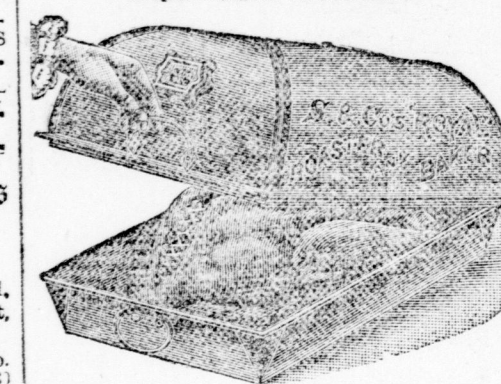

—At Buffalo on Thursday evening the
Independent Order of Foresters tendered a

chief ranger of the order, who has been in
attendance at the Fraternal Congress in
that city.

—Mrs. Forester, of Wanstead, while on
a visit to her niece, Mrs. H. Caran, here,

and broke the radius of the forearm in the
fall. Mrs. Forester may take legal pro-

—At the Police Court yesterday morn-

Clarke vs. Provincial Provident Insti-
tution.—Holmuth (London), for plaintiff,
moved to set aside non-suit entered by
Meredith, J., after the trial in an action
to recover a benefit for permanent disability
upon a certificate or policy issued by the
defendants to the plaintiff. The trial
judge held that the plaintiff could not suc-
ceed without the certificate of a medical
director of the defendants required by the
rules of the defendants, and that the
plaintiff had not established such a prima
facie case of misconduct on the part of
such medical director in withholding his
certificate as entitle the plaintiff to have
the case submitted to a jury. Mc-
