

> General Advance on Pekin Expected in About Two Weeks-Indications That the Capital and the Interior Are in Close Telegraphic Touch—The Consuls Said To Be En Route for Tien Tsin-Letter From Sir Claude MacDonald Dated July 6.

ports from Shanghai reiterate the allegation that the surviving members of the diplomatic corps have already left Pekin on their way to Tien Tsin, and that the foreigners are being escorted by troops of Jung Du, commander-inchief of the Chinese forces. This move is stated to be the outcome of very stormy interviews between Li Hung Chang and the foreign consuls, and to have been taken in the hope of abating the wrath of the powers and delaying the advance of the allies toward Pekin.

Advices received from the same sources state that half the foreigners in Pekin have been killed or wounded, or have died as the result of priva-

Simultaneously comes a cable dispatch to the Daily Mail from Shanghai, announcing that a letter has been re-celved from Sir Claude Macdonald, the British minister to China, under date of Pekin, July 6, saying the le-gations were under constant fire and that three were still standing, but that the foreigners were receiving no assistance from the authorities. Owing to the cowardice of the Chinese, Sir Claude wrote, it was hoped the legationers would be able to hold out for a fortnight, but if they were pressed, their resistance could not last more

SIR C. MACDONALD'S LETTER. The text of the Shanghai dispatch to the Daily Mail follows: "Shanghai, July 27.—A letter just received here from Sir Claude Macdonald, dated Pekin, July 6, follows: 'We are receiving no assistance from the authorities. Three legations are still standing, including the British. We also hold part of the city walls. The Chinese are shelling us from the city with a threeinch gun and some smaller ones, and are sniping us. We may be annihilated any day. Our ammunition and food are short. We would have perished by this time, only the Chinese are cowards, and have no organized plan of attack. If we are not pressed we may hold out a fortnight longer; otherwise, four days at the utmost,

anticipate only slight resistance to the relief force." Sir Claude concludes by advising the relief force to approach by the eastern gate or by way of the river. The losses of the foreigners in Pekin up to July 6 were 40 killed and 80 wounded.

IN TWO WEEKS. London, July 27-4:30 a.m.-With the report that the allies will begin the advance upon Pekin in a fortnight, and in view of Admiral Seymour's visit of inspection to the Yang Tse Kiang, the feeling is that no great time will elapse before matters assume a more definite shape.

AN AWFUL MASSACRE. There is an unconfirmed Chinese re-

port that 60 Protestant and Catholic missionaries have been massacred in Ki Yuan Fu and the vicinity.
The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Mail, describing the massacre at Mukden, says: "The bishop had armed 200 converts to defend the cathedrals, and a body of Chinese troops had been sent to defend the convents, but the soldiers were leagued with the Boxers. While the Christians were holding a service, believing themselvs safe under the Chinese section of the troops, the signal was given and the soldiers and Boxers surrounded and set fire to the church, putting the escaping worship-ers to the sword. The bishop was captured and taken to the viceroy's yamen, where he was diabolically tortured and decapitated. His head now

hangs in front of the yamen." IMPORTANT INFERENCE. Toronto, Ont., July 26 .- The China Inland Mission agent at Shanghai cabled the following message to the North American headquarters here this morning: "Shanghai, July 26.—C. H. S. Green wired 14th inst. from Tai Yuen Lu, the capital of Shen Si: Rioted. No details. Shuen Teh Lu Whai Lu rioted. All destroyed. Friends safe; escaped to country, but there is danger.

AN EXPLANATION.

The Daily Mail explains that the Chinese employe of the British legation, who, according to its advices yesterday, escaped from Pekin to Niu Chwang, and reported there that when he left Pekin most of the members of the legation were dead, and the fate of others were hopeless, did not acturelied upon, that a general massacre had not occurred on July 6, as had been reported.

A CHINESE DEFEAT. The Russians inflicted another serious defeat upon the Chinese at Fort Echo on July 23.

London, July 27-4 a.m.-Last Saturday the Chinese minister, Sir Chih Chen Lo Feng Luh, handed the foreign office a long tellegram purporting liciting Great Britain's good offices to bring about peace in terms similar to the appeals addressed to President McKinley and President Loubet. Thus far the government has not replied, as it is felt that, in the present anomalous circumstances, the precise origin of the telegram is doubtful.

Refugees are beginning to arrive from all points in the most pitiable condition.

SEYMOUR AIT SHANGHAI. Shanghai, July 26.—Admiral Sey-mour has arrived here, and has been in consultation with the British con-sul regarding the situation.

WARLIKE PREPARATIONS. Active preparations in the Yang Tse region for war are now in progress, not for war against the rebels, but against foreign powers. Junk loads of Chinese soldiers and Boxers, disguised as coolies, are arriving here daily.
