VON BUELOW'S POSITION SHAKY. Berlin, Aug. 23.—Count Von Buelow's position as minister of foreign affairs for the empire has been so seriously shaken by his differences with the kaiser on the subject of the latter's China speeches-differences which have led the emperor to take the direction of the Chinese matters out of the count's hands and to assume personal control thereof himself-that the downfall of the statesman is regarded here as imminent.

MAY MAKE UP.

London, Aug. 23. - Numerous dispatches appear in the morning papers regarding the Bulgaria-Roumanian situation, growing out of the demand of Roumania for the suppression of the Macedonian revolutionary committee, whose headquarters is at Sofia. What appears the most reliable summary of the latest developments comes from the Vienna correspondent of the Standard, who says: "The conviction prevails that the conflict between Roumania and Bulgaria has now lost much of its acuteness, and that in the end Bulgaria will satisfy Roumanian demands.

Rome, Aug. 23. — During the last few weeks duels have caused a perfect slaughter in Italy. As many as four duelists were killed in different towns last Saturday. During the last year 2,-400 duels have been fought in Italy and 480 deaths have resulted. Most of these combats were between army officerts and based on the most trivial pre-
