ANOTHER SUDDEN DEATH.

Richard Hall Ruptures a Blocd Vessel and Dies Without a Belping Hand-The Inquest.

An inquest was held last night on the remains of the late Richard Hall, a man about 64 years of age, who was found dead in his bedroom at noon yesterday. The inquest was held in the little back kitchen of nis late residence, 566½ Richmond street. The room was a very small one, about 16x12 feet in dimensions, and in it were crowded the coroner, sixteen able-bodied jurors, a policeman, a doctor, two medical students, one or two on-lookers and a witness, when called for. A stove, with a kettle singing merrily, a pile of wood, and a table occupied more room and added somewhat to the discomfort of the jurors, who were sitting in some instances, on one another's laps. Coroner Flock was in charge, and the following jury was empanneled: Thos. Brown (foreman). Wm. Stater, Wesley Webb, Robt. M. Graham, Robt. Ironsides, John Jones, Chas. Fitzgerald, Samuel Jenkins, William McFarlane, John G. Noyes, Albert Johnston, Henry Tozer, Thomas Trebilcock and John Cruickshanks. After viewing the remains the evidence of the man's daughter, Frances Hall, was heard.

was cold in the extremities, and had been dead for some time. He telephoned for Dr. Mitchell right away. The deceased was of a cheerful disposition, not at all given to moreseness, and the witness did not think he would take his own life. The razor that was found near the body had probably been used in shaving a few minutes before death came.

Mrs. Lena Riley, the next door neighbor had heard nothing out of the way. The last sine saw of the deceased was about 8:45 that morning. He was then engaged in cutting wood.

Dr. Mitchell made the post-mortem examination. The body was, he said, well nourished. All the other organs were in a healthy condition. Death resulted, the doctor said, from aneurism of the ascending acrta. This was interpreted to the jurymen to mean rupture of the large blood vessel leading from the heart. The jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes.
