CITY FATHERS WRESTLE WITH HOSPITAL AND PAVEMENTS

Expenditures of One and Tenders of Other Subjects of Debate.

Eight New Firemen Authorized Without Dissenting Vote.

Ald. Stevenson Hits at the Board of Health—Springbank Water and Typhoid Fever.



There was a discussion on the part of the aldermen to get through the proceeding in as quick a manner as possible, and the business of the evening was attended to for a while in a lively manner.

When the resolution of the hospital trust regarding the placing of tents on the hospital grounds for contagious patients was read by City Clerk Edwards, the gist of which has already been published in The Advertiser, there was a disposition to thrash hospital matters out at length, though this disposition was nipped in the bud by Ald. Judd, who was acting mayor. Mayor Beck being in Montreal on business. It was probably as well for his worship that he was not present, for some of the aldermen indulged in pointed questions, for which there appeared to be no answers, regarding the expenditure at Victoria Hospital, and whether it was a white elephant or a hospital the people were paying for.

Ald. Campbell suggested that it might be as well to file the communication or else let the council take up the question of a separate hospital for contagious patients in London, as was intimated by the trust.

HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION.
Ald. Cooper said either there was a whole lot of useless talk regarding contagious diseases in the city, or else there was a crying need for more accommodation. If there was, and the council should at once take hold of the situation and vote the funds necessary for the board of health to get through with at least something should be done to improve the present smallpox hospital, which he declared to be a pig pen. He moved that \$500 be placed at the credit of the board of health for the purpose of providing additional accommodation for contagious patients.

Ald. Judd moved the motion out of order, but Ald. Saunders arose and declared that as \$125,000 had been spent on the hospital a short time ago, and more was being spent every day, it was a queer thing that there was not accommodation for such a small epidemic as London now suffered. It was queer the scarlet fever and diphtheria patients could not be accommodated without putting them in tents. He understood that when the money for the nurses' home was voted, the accommodation at the hospital would be increased and he hoped put on a proper basis. Otherwise he would not have voted for the nurses' home expenditure.

HOT SHOT.
Ald. Stevenson accused the board of health of squandering the city's money in running to meetings at the harbor and stopping off and having a good time at Toronto Fair. He said the supply of water at Springbank was continually being contaminated by sewage, and the first thing the people would know they would be up against an epidemic of typhoid fever. The board of health appeared to him to be no good and derelict in their duty. The sewers were blamed for the present epidemic of diphtheria, but it would be a good thing to have the water at Springbank analyzed. He moved that the trust's communication go to No. 1 to provide funds.

diphtheria to the lack of a proper garbage system.

At length, upon motion of Ald. Greenleaf, seconded by Ald. Becher, the trust's communication was read.

KING STREET PAVEMENT TENDERS.
The pavement epidemic was then wrestled with.
A petition, headed by W. J. Thompson, and bearing the signatures of residents of both sides of King street, between Wellington and Maitland, was received, praying that the council award the contract for the proposed pavement on that street, to the lowest tender; and in the event of the council having no power to do this, that they take measures to annul the by-law for the pavement, and call for new tenders. Competition, the petitioners declared, was what they wanted. Those on the petition besides W. J. Thompson, were George Thompson, Frank Thompson, Ellen Ferguson, John Anderson, Alex. Fardon, W. H. Winnett, Wm. Jones, Geo. Tambling, T. H. Purdon, Frank Adams, F. A. Fitzgerald, John Purdon, E. E. Nightingale, John B. Tanton, L. H. Scandrett, Geo. M. Reid, John Shopland, Minnie McBride, Harry M. Ryan, J. R. Minihick, Chas. S. Moore and A. J. Steele. Mr. T. H. Purdon, K. C., solicitor for the petitioners, was present and addressed the council. He said that the board of works was now obtaining the opinion of the solicitor as to the legality of the council's accepting the lowest tender. It might be considered out of place to discuss the matter now. His advice, however, was to get competition, if possible. Toronto's city solicitor had advised the aldermen of that city that it was illegal to call for tenders for any particular class of pavement. There could be no competition. It was making a farce of the calling for tenders when such a thing was done. It was not right, either, for agents to go about asking people to sign petitions for any particular class of pavement. The people did not as a rule know what they were signing for and were befuddled and in the dark. This was proven by the fact that there had been a petition already this year, for a pavement on King street, and many people's names appeared on all three petitions. This being the case, the council should step in and with the aid of the engineer, who was an expert, say which was the best pavement, and then let it be put down. He asked that the prayer of the petition be granted, and that if the council could do nothing else, new tenders be called for and the people given the benefits of competition.

PEOPLE Muddled.
Ald. Greenleaf agreed with the arguments put forth by Mr. Purdon. There was no doubt that the people did not know exactly where they were at. It behooved the council to step in and decide for the people what pavement was best, and if the council could save the people \$1,000 by accepting the lowest tender the council should do so. At all events nothing should be done till Mr. Meredith's opinion had been received. Ald. Judd advocated the throwing out of both tenders, and calling for new ones at once for any class of asphalt, and the pavement put down on the initiative of the council should do so. At all events, the people of King street would get their pavement for \$150 a yard.

A DIFFERENT OPINION.
Ald. Forristal said King street had been made a football of long enough. The tender should be accepted, or else there would not be a pavement on the street for another year. Nobody knew anything about California asphalt, which the lowest tender called for. The Barber pavement had at all events been proven a fairly good one, and he was in favor of the Trinidad asphalt and the Barber tender.

Ald. Gerry explained that he had supported the Barber tender in the only legal tender before the board of works. Trinidad asphalt had been called for, and he thought the council should now be left over till next year. He got "grease" from nobody, but was trying to do his duty for the people. Ald. Cooper denied both the statements made by Ald. Saunders that this was the first year he had stood out and obtained competition on the Warren pavements, something which could not be had when Trinidad asphalt was asked for. The discussion continued along this line for some further time, and finally the Thompson petition was sent to the board of works, the object being merely to stay proceedings regarding the acceptance of a tender for the pavement until the city solicitor's advice had been secured.

EIGHT NEW FIREMEN.
The report of No. 3 committee recommended that an additional fireman be appointed in each fire hall in addition to the five men required to man the new steam fire engines, a total of eight in all, and the recommendation was adopted without debate.

Applications for the position will be advertised for at once.

Ald. Matthews moved, seconded by Ald. Saunders, a resolution that the council instruct the clerk to write the secretary of the Underwriters' Association, and see what reduction in insurance rates the underwriters are willing to make if the city buys more fire engines and complies with the recommendations made by the secretary of the association, some time ago, and the council accepted it without debate. In view of the prevalence of diphtheria in the city now, the hospital trust be requested to supply the doctors of the city with a supply of anti-toxin, to be placed at the disposal of the poor people of the city, for whom no accommodation could be furnished at the hospital.

The idea struck the council as a good

one, and it was adopted, with the change that the anti-toxin be left in the hands of the mayor and medical health officer to distribute to the physicians of poor people.

COMMUNICATIONS AND PETITIONS.

The communication of Wm. Barry et al., the condition of the creek on Colborne street, was referred to the board of works.

The assessment commissioner sent a communication to the council, in which he stated that under the new assessment act the city stood to lose about \$20,000 annually in taxes, and claimed that the burden of taxation had been removed from the rich man to the poor man. It was sent to No. 1 committee to deal with.

E. W. Nelson, of Brantford, applied for a position as engineer on a steam fire engine, and the application was sent to No. 3 committee.

A request from the Trades and Labor Council, asking for the free use of the city hall for an assembly on Friday evening, Nov. 13, was granted. The following were sent to the board of works.

From John Haywood et al., against a tile sewer on Queen's avenue, and Elizabeth streets.

From Macbeth & Macpherson, stating that a man named Thos. Henry had taken gravel from the farm of Walter Wright, and delivered it on certain roads in the city. They gave notice that Mr. Wright would look to the city for payment.

From G. Coombe and others, asking for an asphalt pavement on William street, between Dundas and King.

From J. W. Dwyer, for a cement walk on Blackfriars street, between Wilson avenue and Wharfedale road.

From W. C. Fitzgerald, barrister, re Mrs. Doe's fence on Richmond street, between Dundas and King.

From V. Cronin, proposed new sewer on Dundas street, between Wellington and Adelaide, and that he would oppose the work.

The bylaws relating to the powers of the park commissioner and his duties were read a first, second and third time, and put through.

FOR A UNION DEPOSED.

Ald. Stevenson moved, seconded by Ald. Forristal, that a committee be appointed from this council to enter into communication or otherwise confer with the representatives of the different railroads entering into this city, to determine if to provide for a union station, and if possible to ask the railroads to provide some other arrangement for passenger and freight trains, and whatever is necessary to arrange for better railroad service to this city. The motion was sent to No. 1 committee to deal with.

There were present, Ald. Judd (acting mayor), Campbell, Stevenson, Greenleaf, Becher, Saunders, Gerry, Cooper, Abram, Wyatt, Forristal and City Clerk Edwards.

OF RARE EXCELLENCE WAS THE AUDITORIUM RECITAL

Delightful Evening Provided by Messrs. Martin, Dwight-Edwards and Wheeler.



THE success of a recital by such a trio as Thomas Martin, Cyril Dwight-Edwards, and Charles E. Wheeler might be confidently predicted as to make even subsequent confirmation unnecessary. Those who were not numbered among the large audience at the Auditorium last night, missed a concert of rare excellence. It has probably passed from the recollection of most Londoners that Mr. Martin came to this city with a reputation that entitled him to a position among the five greatest pianists who come to America that year. His work last night entitled him to that honor which is too often withheld from talent that is constantly with us. From the dainty little Mazurka in A flat and C of Chopin, to the Liszt Rhapsodie, and the great "Revolutions" Etude in C minor, of Chopin.

The piano used at the recital was a Steinway Grand, from the Nordheimer warehouses in this city. The magnificent power and purity of its tone displayed both in the delicate accompaniments played by Mr. Wheeler, and the heaviest passages of Mr. Martin's numbers, inspired the most admiring comments.

Many of the audience made a mistake that is growing tiresome, owing to the frequency of its occurrence. The "8 o'clock" of the programme was evidently interpreted by Detroit time, for it was 25 minutes to 9 before a sufficiently large number were present to allow the programme to proceed. Stragglers even then disturbed the programme up till a quarter past 9. Not even ignorance can excuse that. If people have not sufficient good taste to refrain from interrupting numbers, then the ushers should be instructed to absolutely prevent entrance except between divisions.

The color, varying from sensuous to dramatic, which is nature's gift, has been supplemented by a skill in tone production, and a really wonderful development of the breathing powers.

Mr. Charles Wheeler had even more onerous responsibilities than usually fall to the lot of a first-class accompanist. These were borne with the conscientiousness that marks his work and gives the musician's stamp to everything he does.
