AUSTRALIAN IDEA OF FEDERAL UNION

Opposed to a Hard and Fast Imperial Agreement.

COINCIDE WITH SIR WILFRID

Japan Proposes to Build 75 New Warships—Alleged Attempt on Emperor Joseph's Life Failed.

London, May 20.—Australia agrees with Sir Wilfrid Laurier as to the inability of a hard and fast military agreement between Great Britain and the colonies. The announcement of this fact causes neither surprise nor disappointment here. The speech of Lord Salisbury to the Primrose League emphasized most strongly the importance of doing nothing to force the various portions of the British Empire into a closer union than at present obtains. Mr. Chamberlain has also repeatedly warned his countrymen that the desire for closer union must come from the colonies, not from Great Britain. There is undoubtedly a growing desire on the part of Englishmen to strengthen the links that unite the mother country and the daughter states, but, after all, it is admitted that the colonies are the best judges of what they can do and how they can best do it. JAPAN'S AMBITION.

The Tokyo correspondent of the Times states that he states on good authority that the naval programme of naval expansion for Japan for the six years beginning in 1902 will comprise four battleships of 15,000 tons each, two armored cruisers of 10,000 tons each, four second-class cruisers of 5,000 tons each, fifteen destroyers and fifty torpedo boats.

The correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle at Budapest reports the frustration of a plot against the life of Emperor Francis Joseph. The emperor was en route to Budapest by train from Vienna to Budapest. In the final inspection of the imperial train in the terminus of the state railway at Vienna, made ten minutes before his majesty's arrival there, a bomb covered with paper was found in the emperor's compartment. It was evidently calculated that this bomb would explode the moment his majesty entered the car. An investigation of the matter led to the dismissal of several railway employees.

SOME STRIKES SETTLED

Cape Breton Miners Get an Increase in Wages.

Toronto Bakers and Confectioners Accept a Compromise Offer.

BAKERS' WAGES SETTLED.

Toronto, May 20.—The Journeymen Bakers and Confectioners' Union met on Saturday evening in Richmond Hall, and accepted the offer of the employers to compromise with regard to the schedule of wages. The demands of the men were fully met, and the union agreed to work ten hours a day. They asked for 30 cents per hour for jobbers, but compromised at 25 cents.

CAPE BRETON MINERS.

Cape Breton, May 20.—The threatened strike of the miners has been declared off. The companies have granted the ten per cent increase demanded by the men.

GONE BACK TO NIGHTWORK.

Ottawa, May 20.—The bakers of Ottawa, after obtaining the concession of daywork for their employees, have returned to nightwork. The day system did not work satisfactorily.

\$2 ADVANCE IN COAL PRICES.

New York, May 20.—The advance of \$2 a ton in the price of coal will cost New York \$1,164,000 a month. The estimated consumption per month here is about 582,000 tons, made up as follows: Private houses and stores, 10,000 tons; apartments, 158,000 tons; hotels and factories, 112,000 tons; gas companies, 49,000 tons; railroads, 35,000 tons; steamships, 40,000 tons; offices and department stores, 30,000 tons.

COAL FAMINE THREATENED.

Although it is only one week since the anthracite coal miners stopped work, and only three days since the Hazleton Convention ordered an indefinite strike, New York is facing a coal famine. The crisis has been forced by the action of the coal-carrying railroads. Manufacturing concerns all over the country will be affected, and the continuation of the strike is likely to result in a shortage of workmen being thrown out of employment.

WILKESBARRE, MAY 20.—The loss in wages by the coal strike, which has now lasted a week, is \$1,164,000.

NO COAL TRAINS.

Easton, Pa., May 19.—As a result of the anthracite coal miners strike, the fifty-five men employed at the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company's shops here have been put on short time. The Lehigh Valley has taken off all its coal trains, and only three of the fifteen crews usually employed in making up trains here are at work.

STAGNATION PREVAILS.

Hazleton, Pa., May 19.—The second week of the hard coal strike began today with the faintest ripple. Not one of the coal companies in this territory made an attempt to start up a colliery today, and not a miner went near the breakers.

The local miners in all the mining villages and coal patches held meetings today at which speeches were made by the local dealers to keep up the courage of the men. New members were taken in by some of the locals and preparations for relieving distress, in case the strike is prolonged, were discussed. So far as known no applications have been received by the union for aid.

A HAMILTON LIBEL SUIT.

Toronto, May 20.—The Reliance Loan and Savings Company, Limited, of Ontario, has taken action in Toronto, has taken action for unstated damages for libel against the Hamilton Spectator. Hon. John Dryden is president of this company, and on May 5 the Spectator published an article charging in substance that Mr. Dryden used his cabinet position to relieve the company of certain obligations.

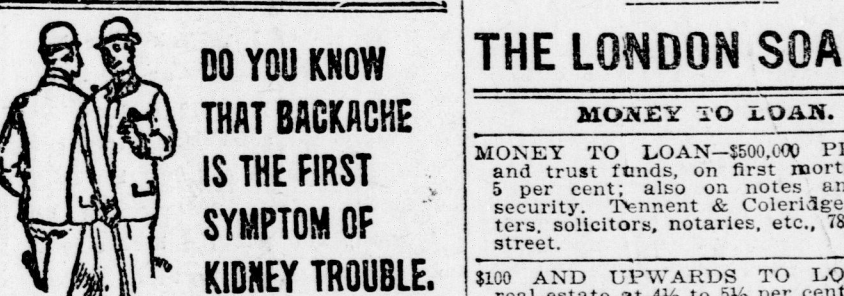
WOODS' FAIR
