Sandwich, March 17. - William hompson, the negro boy who shot his father in the family home in Malden Township, near Amherstburg last fall, will be charged with murder before Judge Teetzel, at the spring assizes here next week, according to the decision reached by the crown after sifting the evidence. It will be the first murder case tried in the Sandwich court for years. Beside the murder trial and one other criminal case, there are twenty-two civil cases slated for trial.
