ALBERTA BY-ELECTIONS

Liberals Concede Election of Four Con-
servatives.

Edmonton, Oct. 31.—At 10 o'clock to-
night, the Liberals conceded the election
of four Conservatives in the by-elections
in Calgary, Lethbridge, Pincher Creek
and Gleichen. The first three were
vacated by members desiring to con-
centrate on the Dominion House seats.
The fourth, in Calgary, was vacated
by the loss of three seats to the
Sifton Government, as Calgary was the
only one previously held by Conserva-
tives at the general election of 1909. Cal-
gary, which has two members, returned
a Liberal and a Conservative. Mr.
Twissie, the incumbent, was defeated
by a large majority. In Lethbridge, Mr.
Stewart has 198, and in Gleichen Mr.
Riley has about 200. Mr. Riley is the brother
of the late Liberal member who re-
turned as a protest against the calling of Mr.
Sifton to the Premiership. In Pincher
Creek the majority of Mr. Kennedy is small.

The elections were fought for the
most part, on the policy of the govern-
ment in handling the Alberta and Great
Waterways matter, now in the courts.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 1.—News of a

FINANCIAL FEATURES OF HOME RULE PLAN

Premier Asquith and Cabinet
Discuss the Subject.

London, Oct. 31.—The home rule
scheme, which has been under secret
preparation for some time past at the
hands of Premier Asquith, Mr. Augus-
tine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland
assisted by Sir John Simon and other
members of the House of
Commons, was discussed today by the
cabinet. It is believed, for the first
time, that the financial features of the
scheme are attracting the attention of
all parties. The theory has been current
that the Imperial Government will be
asked to launch the Irish Government
with a subsidy estimated at from \$75,-
000,000 to \$150,000,000.

The treasury estimates that the Irish
expenditure exceeds the revenue by \$6,-
500,000 annually. The nationalists de-
clare this to be an exaggeration by at
least \$1,500,000. They contend that any
Irish deficit is due to extravagant ex-
penses imposed by Parliament, notably
the cost of the constabulary.

An alternative suggested to a lump
grant is that the Government maintain
the item of Irish expense. Old-age
pensions are principally mentioned. A
report tonight credits the committee in
charge of the home rule scheme as in-
dorsing this. The best opinion is that
the Imperial Parliament will keep con-
trol of Irish customs and excise, thus
insuring a general system for the United
Kingdom and preventing Ireland from
raising a protective wall against Eng-
land, as the dominions have done.

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
