BOND WITH BOURASSA CHARGE OF HUGH GUTHRIE

In Strong Speech Against Government's Naval Bill Member For North Wellington Shows Premier Went to England Fettered by Pledge to the Nationalists.

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—The naval debate was resumed today upon the reassembling of Parliament. Miss Violet Asquith, daughter of the British Prime Minister, was in the speaker's gallery, and Hon. James Duff, minister of agriculture for Ontario, occupied a seat on the floor of the House.

Hugh Guthrie, the Liberal member for South Wellington, opened the discussion by a strong presentation of the case against the Government. He quoted from Mr. Asquith to show the

passage of the German naval act of 1912, and that the legislation by Germany has greatly increased the striking force of the navy, so that now 80 per cent. of the ships were ready for immediate action. The recent Balkan war, he declared, had shown how easily military operations could change the map of Europe; a naval attack he made with much greater certainty. That an emergency did exist at present was recognized by everyone. The fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers were now ready to vote two fleet units, although a year ago they regarded the suggestion of one fleet unit as excessive, demonstrated how quickly events had moved and how serious the Empire situation had become.

Mr. Nesbitt, North Oxford, gave a hearty acquiescence to Mr. Guthrie's views, suggesting with fervor, a general election. He wanted Canadian money kept in Canadian pockets, instead of being sent to England.

He was followed by Dr. J. W. Edwards (Frontenac), who delivered a speech in support of the Government. A Grave Question.

"Our action may be fraught with great results and great consequences," said Mr. Guthrie. I speak now my own mind, and I would that my words should not fall upon deaf ears. There must be something in the nature of the Government's policy, and I give and take it these most important considerations are to have sway. Apart from form, in substance we are not so far apart. You want to give money to build Dreadnoughts; we want to enlarge the Canadian naval service, and undertake our share of imperial defence. Should not our first purpose be to get together and determine if there is not some modification on both sides which would result in a unanimous Canadian action? You might modify your proposal to two Dreadnoughts, and we might modify our policy to have them built in British Columbia, and the balance of two fleet units might be proceeded with in reasonable time in Canada, this work taking the place of the third Dreadnought. Meanwhile we could go on as rapidly as possible with the construction and development of Canadian shipyards. Do not wait for a voice in imperial affairs. Let us take the lead with united and hearty action.

Borden Bill Not Favored.

"The Borden bill has not met a hearty reception from the people. I do not speak boastfully or in a party meeting in my district. I have studied the public sentiment, and I speak what I actually believe when I say the people in that district, altogether apart from politics, are not in favor of the Government's policy. The Liberal policy is the policy from the Canadian point of view, and it is the policy which the British admiralty wants. Let us bridge the chasm, even if it costs some party sacrifice to both sides. If that cannot be done, if the matter cannot be settled in that way, there remains only another appeal to the court of final resort. In a matter of such magnitude—of such importance to Canada and the Empire—there is no emergency, no peril. In an hour of peril there would be no mandate; the policy of all Liberals would be not \$35,000,000, but the last man and the last dollar. But in this hour of security, determining a policy freighted with great results and consequences, why not let the people of Canada, have something to say?"

One For Foster.

Mr. Guthrie spoke to crowded galleries, though the House itself was little over half-filled, many of the members not having yet reached the city. Miss Violet Asquith, daughter of the British Prime Minister, occupied a seat in the speaker's gallery, and followed the proceedings with close interest. Mr. Guthrie's eloquent eulogy of her distinguished father, answering Mr. Foster's contention that Premier Borden was in a position now to know more accurately than Sir Wilfrid Laurier the views of the British admiralty, the member for South Wellington confronted the Canadian Premier with the British Premier, and, paraphrasing the Minister of Trade and Commerce, asked the latter which was in a position to speak

most authentically as to the admiralty's view. "Mr. Asquith is a man held in world-wide admiration," commented Mr. Guthrie. "His great ability, wide experience, and intimate knowledge of the whole chess-board of European politics place him in a position to speak with the authority none other possess. He is a master of concise and pointed expression, a man of recognized strict accuracy of statement."

Whose Opinion Best?

Mr. Guthrie read respectively from the Canadian and British Hansards to show that while Premier Borden was telling the Canadian Parliament that "the situation was sufficiently grave to demand immediate aid," Premier Asquith was assuring the British Parliament that "there never has been and is not now a moment when we have not been overwhelmingly superior to any combination of powers which could be reasonably anticipated."

"Whose opinion would likely be correct?" continued Mr. Guthrie, paraphrasing Mr. Foster's query. "If Borden is right, then Asquith is wrong. If Asquith is right, then Borden is wrong. We on this side of the House cannot without question the statement of the man who is in a position to know, who should know, and who does know."

Mr. Guthrie also quoted from the British Hansard, a speech of Lord Crewe in the House of Lords, and Bonar Law, Balfour, Churchill and Lloyd George in the Commons, reiterating Mr. Asquith's position. He asked Mr. Borden to produce the statement of one British statesman who was qualified to speak, differing from that of those men on both sides of British politics whom he had quoted. How different was their position from that of Mr. Borden and Mr. Foster, who had declared that there was "grave cause for concern," and of Sir Rodmond Roblin, who had had the temerity to declare that "Britain was on her knees begging for our help."

The facts were, Mr. Guthrie maintained, that Premier Borden had gone to England fettered. He did not prefer a general request of the admiralty; the request of a self-respecting Canadian citizen should be: "What can we do?" He had made a circumscribed request, a request with certain conditions attached to it. He had announced that Canada could not have a permanent policy, such as the first lord of the admiralty looked forward to, until the barriers that he (Borden) had conjured up in his imagination had been removed. He wanted representation first. The admiralty had not a free hand in framing its response. It was fettered and circumscribed by Mr. Borden's conditions for immediate and temporary aid.

Bond With Bourassa.

Mr. Guthrie made the startling and unanswered charge, directing his words to the floor specifically to the Premier, who sat silent throughout, that Mr. Borden's attitude in England was dominated by a written pledge given to the Nationalists at the time of the last election.

"I state with assurance," said the member for South Wellington, "that it was more than an understanding; that the Premier was bound by a written document to abolish the naval service act of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Men like Henri Bourassa and Armand Lavigne don't take the mere word; they demanded the bond. Mr. Bourassa answered the call for help from the Conservative candidate in the riding of East Algoma, but he didn't come to their assistance till the documents were signed. So that I say in connection with the Premier's attitude in England, that the Premier, in the shape of a written document, the undertaking, which can be produced and held over the head of the present Government during the whole of its term, is a written pledge for that the Premier would not have come down to the House with the present proposal. He knows in his heart that there is not the slightest danger. It is but a subterfuge to get out of his abominable alliance and pledge to the Nationalists."

Canada's Role Peaceful.

"Suppose it takes a few years; let us start, and start now," exclaimed Mr. Guthrie, amid Liberal cheering. If the present Government had not cancelled the contracts of its predecessors the Canadian shipyards would have been practically ready to start construction. When the best and highest thought the world over was striving to bring about peace, members of the Borden Administration were talking war. Postmaster-General, who well was now seeking to outgauge the jingoism, talked of "loaded cannon in Germany pointing at Britain," and Minister of Militia Hughes went to British Columbia and announced that "Germany must be taught a lesson."

Was such their idea of Canada's participation in imperial dignity? Canada would attain her highest role as an ambassador of peace. Many of her best citizens in business and agriculture were Germans. There were no more peaceful, intelligent, thrifty and industrious citizens than the German Canadians.

Mr. Guthrie devoted some time to a scathing analysis of Mr. Foster's December speech. The member for North Toronto had been requisitioned as a political revivalist to restore the dropping spirit of the Government supporters to administer a stimulant of oratorical display. He compared Mr. Foster's "horrid, overdone utterances" with those of the British statesmen in the House of Commons today. Mr. Foster's ghostly scare of danger and peril, derived, as the speaker had confessed, from "drinking in the atmosphere of London." The only difference was that Mr. Guthrie, who believed that it is like Canada's right and duty to do a generous share, and if need arises we believe Canada will come to the front, not with a contribution of \$35,000,000, but with a contribution that amount, but to her last dollar and her last man.

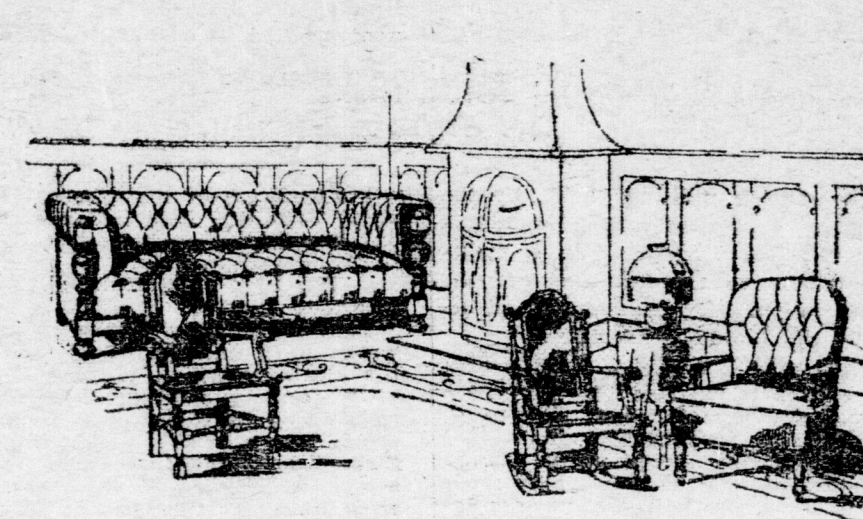

TO SUPPORT BORDEN BILL MEANT BREAKING PLEDGES

Mr. Monk's Letter of Resignation Tabled in Commons With Premier's Reply.

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—Correspondence which passed between the Prime Minister and Hon. F. D. Monk, when the latter resigned as a member of the Government over the naval question, was tabled in the House of Commons today. Mr. Monk's letter of resignation is as follows:

"To the Right Hon. R. L. Borden, Prime Minister, Ottawa.

"My Dear Premier,—I regret to find that I cannot concur in the decision arrived at by the cabinet yesterday to place on behalf of Canada an emergency contribution of \$35,000,000 at the disposal of the British Government for naval purposes, with the sanction of Parliament about to assemble, but without giving the Canadian people an opportunity of expressing its approval of this important step before it is taken.

"Such a concurrence would be at variance with my pledges, and the act proposed is of sufficient gravity to justify my insistence. It goes beyond the scope of the constitutional act of 1867. Holding this view, as a member of your cabinet, I feel it is my duty to place my resignation in your hands.

"Permit me to add that my decision has been reached with regret, on account of my agreeable relations at all times with yourself, Yours sincerely, (Signed) F. D. MONK."

Premier's Reply.

The Premier's reply was written two days later, as follows:

"My Dear Mr. Monk,—I received this morning, with very great regret, the letter by which you place in my hands your resignation as a member of the Government. The information which has been placed before us by His Majesty's Government discloses to grave a situation that in my judgment the granting of immediate and effective aid is necessary in the interest of this Dominion, as part of the British Empire. Such a step is entirely of a temporary character, and is absolutely distinct from a permanent policy of co-operation in imperial defence, which, when formulated, ought to be placed before the people for their consideration and approval.

Your resignation is a matter of special regret to me, as I most fully recognize and appreciate your very earnest devotion to the duties of the onerous and important office which you have filled since the 10th of October, 1911, and the very great assistance and kindly consideration which I have always received at your hands. Yours faithfully, (Signed) R. L. BORDEN, Hon. F. D. Monk, M. P., Ottawa."
