Believe Windsor Trip Designed to Veil Hydro Commission's Work.

Opponents of the suggested purchase of the London street railway by the city, say that they can detect "the fine Italian hand" of Sir Adam Beck behind the project. Mayor Cameron Wilson proposes

that within a few days time the members of the London city council shall accompany him to Windsor to view at close range the trackless trolley system in vogue in the border cities, operated and controlled by the hydro-electric commission.

That this undertaking is nothing more or less than a "camouflaged" movement and the proverbial "herring across the trail," leading up to the ultimate adoption of the local street railway line by the provincial commission, is the stout contention of those members of the council who have to date viewed askance any move in that direction.
