F. T. COSTELLO TO HEAD BOARD

Appointed Chairman of Commission To Arbitrate Canadian Rails Dispute.

Harding Asks U. S. Congress To Be Prepared For Emergencies.

OTTAWA, Aug. 8.—(Canadian Press).—F. T. Costello, barrister, of Alexandria, Ont., has been appointed chairman of the board of conciliation and investigation in the dispute between the Canadian National Railways and its employees who are members of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees.

The appointment was made this afternoon by the minister of labor in the absence of a unanimous recommendation from the two parties. The men are represented on the board by H. S. Ross of Montreal, and the company by George D. Kelly of Ottawa. The dispute is over a reduction of wages.

KEEP HOUSE SITTING.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—President Harding has asked congressional leaders, in view of the menacing industrial situation arising from coal and rail strikes, to hold the House, now in recess, continuously in session, along with the Senate, after the house reconvenes next Tuesday.

The prospect was that, failing early settlement of the labor controversies, the administration might call for legislative action to enable the government to cope with conditions which thus far have failed to react favorably to efforts on the part of the executive.

Meanwhile, the leaders of all union organizations in the transportation field began to gather in Washington for conferences to determine the response which shall be made to President Harding's latest offer of a settlement basis for the seven railroad unions now on strike, and to determine as well, according to statements of those who will participate, what joint or co-operative action the labor forces shall take in case the president's offer is rejected.

Want Offer Rejected.

B. M. Jewell, chairman of the group of officers of the striking unions, declared he had received hundreds of telegrams today from locals of the shop unions, "telling us to reject the president's offer, and not a single one asking its acceptance."

Separate conference between the railway officials and representatives of the striking shippers on its lines broke up finally today, when the men declared that only a national settlement of the strike could be accepted by them, even though the railroad conceded seniority rights to returning strikers.

Fairfax Harrison, president of the road, later issued a general notice to all its employees that the company considered it had "more than fulfilled its obligations to the striking employees," and that its duty was now for unimpaired transportation service.

"This, we will perform," Mr. Harrison declared.

May Resume Control.

Suggestions were advanced that Congress might be asked to authorize resumption of federal control over the railroad systems should President Harding find it impossible to terminate the strike satisfactorily, with the further possibility that direct legislation amending the transportation act might be sought to make the railroad labor board decisions in wage matters binding upon managements and employees.

There was also a proposal in some quarters that jurisdiction might be given the board by law over differences which arise during a strike, as did the present seniority issue.

Mr. Jewell and W. H. Johnson, president of the Machinists' Association, charged that strikebreakers were being "chained in Europe, particularly England, by the roads," naming the Chesapeake & Ohio, as one such road.

"We found at Huntington, W. Va., men who had been brought over for the purpose," Mr. Johnson asserted, "and we called British labor organizations asking them to spread the knowledge of these American advertisements, and intend also to cite the cases to the immigration authorities as violation of the contract labor laws."

TELEGRAPHERS MAY STRIKE.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 8.—Following the announcement that a strike ballot was being spread, a strike of telegraphers on the Big Four Railroad was said by members of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers in Cincinnati terminal to be a possibility "within a few days."

It was said the main cause for promulgating the strike ballot was the failure of a recent conference with the management regarding what is known as the "split track," whereby operators are required to work eight hours in any twelve, in some cases being assigned to work four hours, be laid off for four hours, and then work another four hours.

There are 1,100 men in the group that is taking the strike vote.

STILL HOPES STEWART WILL JOIN WHEAT BOARD

Alberta Premier Believes Nominee Delaying to Consult His Various Interests.

CALGARY, Alta., Aug. 8.—(Canadian Press).—Premier Greenfield is not yet convinced that James Stewart and F. W. Riddell will not accept the position on the wheat board. Because of this uncertainty, H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta, who has been offered the position of chairman of the board, still declines to announce any decision.

Premiers Greenfield and Dunning wired Mr. Stewart on Sunday noon and have received no reply. The delay is regarded as not unfavorable, as it is believed here that it is caused by extensive consultation of his different interests.

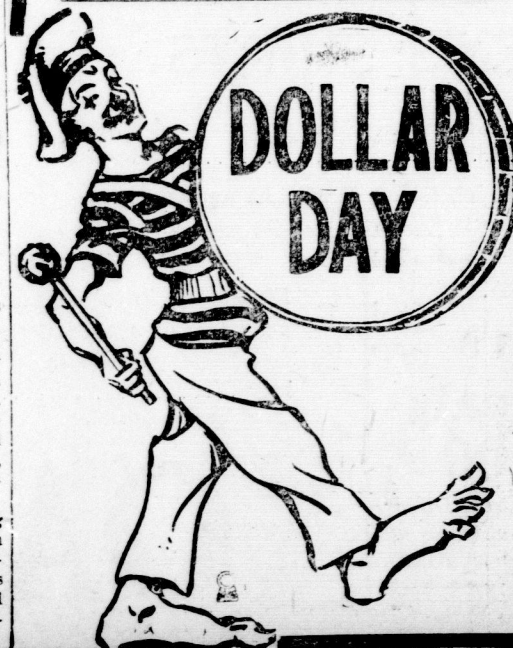
