The Progressive leader declared emphatically that it was not until after 1923 election that he had learned that Ridout was the purchaser of the issue which the treasury board had authorized in April. Details such as the alloting of such issues, he explained, were left in the hands of the minister within whose jurisdiction they came. In passing, he added that on an earlier occasion he had unwittingly trespassed on the jurisdiction of Mr. Smith, and had taken care not to offend so again.






