MASSEY MAY RUN FOR DURHAM SEAT

New Minister Nominated in Old Home County of Massey Family.

Special to The Advertiser.
Orono, Ont., Sept. 17.—Durham Liberals at their convention this afternoon tendered the Liberal nomination in that constituency to Vincent Massey, who was this week sworn in as member of the King cabinet.

Mr. Massey said he would take a few days to consider the matter. The new minister addressed the gathering. He intimated that he would be able to give a reply by Monday next, and added:

"I believe that I shall be able on that day to say yes, and that with your help we shall be able together to make a gallant fight in this constituency for those principles which we all have deeply at heart."

"I believe that this coming election is the most crucial one in this generation," said Mr. Massey. "I believe that we are now in this country in the throes of a real national crisis, and that is why a few days ago I made the decision to go into the fight. We have against us on the other side of the contest one idea only, and it is a wrong idea. On the other hand we Liberals have a program which I conceive to be really a platform wide enough and strong enough for thinking men and women with sincerity and conviction to stand on in whatever part of Canada they may live. We must go into the fight with a conviction that we are going to win it."

BIRTHPLACE OF FIRM.
In offering the nomination to Mr. Massey, the Liberals of Durham are paying a compliment to a family which was formerly resident in the county. The original workshop of what grew to be the present Massey-Harris Company was established at Newcastle, Ontario, within the county of Durham. This was established by the Massey family.

It was later moved to Toronto and became one of the greatest manufacturing concerns under the British flag. The Massey family have not forgotten the county of their origin, and a few years ago, largely through the generosity of Vincent Massey, a fine community hall was established at the village of Newcastle.

CLARK NOMINATED BY CONSERVATIVES
Former M. P. Is Choice of North Bruce Tories at Southampton.

Southampton, Sept. 17.—Col. Hugh Clark of Kincairdine, former member of parliament, was chosen to carry the Conservative banner for the North Bruce riding at an optimistic convention in which over 200 took part here today.

Col. Clark, who was generally conceded the choice, was given a hearty reception when he stepped to the platform to thank his supporters for their faith in him as a candidate. In all, there were seven names mentioned for the nomination, but after the opening ceremonies the other six possibilities dropped out, and Col. Clark was given unanimous endorsement.

Chief among the possibilities for the choice was William Mitchell of Kincairdine, who withdrew by asking his hearers to give Col. Clark unanimous support. H. A. Stevens of Port Elgin, D. J. Byers of Winton, A. F. George of Port Elgin, William Dobson of Underwood and Charles Green of Southampton followed suit.

All of the speakers expressed faith in the Hon. Arthur Meighen as the leader of the party. Major Jelford of Northumberland, who delivered the chief address, bitterly attacked the action of the King government regarding the Petersen shipping contract. Matthew Duncan, M.P. for North Grey, hit the premier's transportation policy, referring to it as "foolish extravagance."

The other speakers were W. N. Middleborough, K.C., of Owen Sound, D. J. Byers, warden of Bruce county, and Matthew Kennedy of Owen Sound.

LABOR GAINS NEW SEAT FROM ENGLISH TORIES

London, Sept. 17.—The Labor party gained a seat in the House of Commons at the expense of the Conservatives in a by-election at Stockport today. The Laborite, A. E. Townsend, polled 20,219 against the Conservative 17,296.

In the last election the Conservative majority was about 7,000. The Labor vote represents a gain of about 5,000.

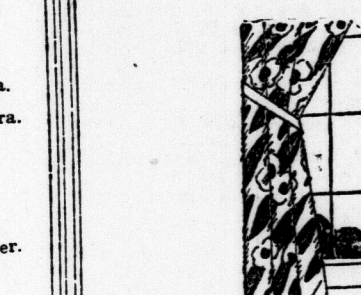
