Orono, Ont., Sept. 17 .- Durham Liberals at their convention this afternoon tendered the Liberal nomination in that constituency to Vincent Massey, who was this week sworn in as member of the King cabinet. Mr. Massey said he would take a few days to consider the matter.

The new minister addressed the gathering. He intimated that he would be able to give a reply by Monday next, and added:

"Hoping that I shall be able on that day to say yes, and that with your help we shall be able together to make a gallant fight in this constituency for those principles which we all have deeply at heart."

"I believe that this coming election is the most crucial one in this generation," said Mr. Massey. "I believe that we are now in this country in the throes of a real national crisis, and that is why a few days crisis, and that is why a few days ago I made the decision to go into the fight. We have against us on the other side of the contest one idea only and it is a wrong idea. On the other hand we Liberals have a program which I conceive to be really national, really constructive and a platform wide enough and strong national, really constitutions, really platform wide enough and strong enough for thinking men and women with sincerity and conviction to stand on in whatever part of Canada they may live. We must go into the fight with a conviction that we are going
